Location: Sherwood Rough (sometimes referred to as Fairmile Bottom).

Parking: Parking is in the middle of a very long lay-by on the A29, about a mile and a half south of Whiteways roundabout. Lay-by has room for easily a dozen trucks. Beware two smaller parking areas on the A29 just before it. What3Words is ///limiting.steers.voltages

Brief Description: The first part of the walk includes one **moderately steep incline** up to the top of the escarpment. However the walk leader will use a less direct uphill path than the main one shown on OS maps, and this alternative path cuts across the contour of the slope and makes the ascent easier.

The focus includes looking for Hawfinches in an area called Sherwood Rough, although the birds can be fickle and are not guaranteed. A walking pole is likely to help people with knee issues.

Suggested clothing: Warm, waterproof clothing depending on weather conditions; strong footwear or wellington boots after rain. (In summer, sun hat and appropriate clothing for sunny/hot weather, although this is likely to be a winter walk).

Fluids: Please bring sufficient fluids appropriate to the weather conditions.
