

NOTABLE BIRDS OF THE SHOREHAM AREA IN 1990

In terms of weather during the year, 1990 closely mirrored 1989, mild in the early months but with severe January and February storms, followed by a long, hot summer, and generally mild through to the end of the year. In the absence of hard weather no major associated movements or influxes occurred, but the early gales produced a number of interesting sightings; and for once, warm spring southerlies brought our fair share of overshooting southern European rarities.

Without very cold conditions, January remained rather quiet but still had its movements. A Peregrine was seen at Mill Hill on 18th, Bewick's Swans again graced the Upper Adur levels, 12 Slavonian Grebes were on the sea off Worthing on 20th, and 3 Snow Buntings were present at Shoreham harbour to 11th. Most unusual was a Great Skua, which flew E at Goring beach on 29th, in a strong SW gale, the same conditions being responsible for sightings of 2 Little Gulls at Worthing in the same period. Only 1 Mediterranean Gull was noted in this month, in Shoreham harbour on 12th, and a Glaucous Gull frequented Brighton Marina from 26th to 28th. Interesting passerines were a Water Pipit on Widewater, a Brambling in a Worthing garden, 2 Black Redstarts at coastal sites, and very few wintering Chiffchaffs and Blackcaps.

Great Skuas continued to be seen in the February storms, with a total of 4 from the Worthing beaches early in the month. In this month there were several sightings of Short Eared Owls, mainly from the Adur valley, a Buzzard over Sompting brooks on 12th and unusual gulls were again prominent with 2 Glaucous Gulls, 2 Mediterranean Gulls, and higher than usual Little Gull numbers. A Shag was in Brighton Marina on 3rd, & other species of note during February included Slavonian Grebe, Black Redstart, and Blackcap.

Mild conditions remained into March, and hopes were high of early migrants. We were not to be disappointed, with very early Wheatears, Sand Martins, House Martins, Chiffchaffs, Sandwich Terns and one Willow Warbler midmonth. A number of Firecrests were noted in early March, and other passerine highlights included 2 Ring Ouzels, 2 Water Pipits at Widewater on 31st, 2 Bramblings at Goring on 12th, and another Black Redstart mid-month. Turning to the sea, an exceptional marsh duck passage took place off Worthing on 31st, with record numbers of Shoveler and Pintail passing eastwards; in addition, on the same day 7 Avocets flew E there plus a Great Skua. Other seawatch highlights for the month were 8 Garganey past Brighton Marina on 18th, and 15 Velvet Scoter past Worthing beach on 17th. A Purple Sandpiper, now seldom seen in our recording area in numbers above 3 or 4, was at Brighton Marina on 3rd.

Early April brought the bird of the year, who amongst us could have predicted a Great Spotted Cuckoo? Nevertheless, one was reportedly first seen from a lorry at the traffic lights on the Shoreham flyover on Apr 4, and was relocated in the grounds of Ricardo's early on 5th, staying for at least 3 weeks, and was well-watched by many hundreds of observers during its stay. It may be worth mentioning that three of us had travelled to Devon in the previous week to see an earlier arrival of this species; hardly expecting another to turn up on our "doorstep".

On 23rd, whilst the Great Spotted Cuckoo was still entertaining many observers, a Red Rumped Swallow was seen at Widewater; and, during the evening, two of this species were well-watched at Brooklands, flying off eastwards at dusk. Both the Recorder and the Editor separately passed Brooklands whilst these birds were present, and didn't stop; so near, and yet so far! A Purple Heron was reported flying E, then inland, at Worthing beach on 21st, completing the month's rarities. Raptors included an early Hobby on 15th, 2 Peregrines on 5th & 22nd, and a Buzzard on 13th. Most incoming landbird migrants first arrived on typical or even slightly later dates; the more unusual involved a few Wood Warblers at the end of the

month, a Grasshopper Warbler on 17th, a Firecrest at Wiston on 25th, & just 1 Pied Flycatcher.

Another area first was a Mandarin Duck past Worthing beach on 29th, at which site, in brief, notable species during the month included Manx Shearwater, Pomarine Skua (in numbers), Great Skua, Goosander, Velvet Scoter, Avocet, and a number of Mediterranean Gulls. Brighton Marina produced a Garganey on 25th, 4 Avocets on 1st, and a Roseate Tern on 25th.

May was warm, with more overshooting vagrants; a Little Egret passed Worthing beach on 14th & a Hoopoe was at Patcham on 3rd. 2 incoming Short-eared Owls were noted at Worthing beach in the first week of May, & another Buzzard flew over Woods Mill on 6th. Passerine arrivals included Firecrest, Wood Warbler, Ring Ouzel, and good spring numbers of Whinchats in early-month. As usual for May, the unusual appeared most frequently on sea-watches. To avoid duplication these are summarized succinctly here, as they appear both in the systematic list and seawatch report. At Worthing beach a Red-necked Grebe was present on May 1, after which Shag, Velvet Scoter, Avocet, Little Ringed Plover, Knot, Ruff, Spotted Redshank, Pomarine & Arctic Skuas, Mediterranean Gull, Roseate and Black Terns were the rarer species recorded. Little Gulls passed eastwards in unprecedented numbers.

In contrast, June passed quietly, with Crossbills (no doubt part of the huge country-wide invasion) at Broadwater on 9th and Cissbury on 23rd. At the latter site, a Quail called on 10th. 4 Little Gulls flew W at Ferring on the early date of June 25th.

Crossbills were again heard flying over Cissbury on 30th July, and there were 2 of this species over the Sanctuary on 22nd. 2 Quail called at Steepdown on 9th but otherwise July was as quiet as June. 2 Manx Shearwaters passed Worthing beach on 1st, there were 3 Green Sandpipers at Woods Mill on 13th, and interestingly, a juvenile Redstart was trapped at the Sanctuary on 29th.

August highlights were undoubtedly the three White Storks, the first over Worthing on 1st, & 2 were tracked from Durrington through to Portslade on 24th. Apparently these latter two birds were noted above my place of work in Durrington; something of this nature usually happens when I am on holiday! Potentially the second area Icterine Warbler was at Woods Mill on 27th. Vagrant "Hippolais" warblers are very rare in our area, and can prove somewhat elusive anyway; but are still most welcome! Waders included an Avocet past Goring beach on 1st, and a scattering of Green and Curlew Sandpipers. A high count of 64 "Yellow legged" Gulls were at Washington tip on 11th, & a Short-eared Owl flew over Sompting brooks on 27th. The only Wryneck of the year was at Hollingbury on 15th. Crossbills continued to appear over Cissbury, small groups noted there on 8 dates during the month, & Quail was heard there on 2 dates. Seawatching produced Manx Shearwater, Pomarine Skua, Shag, and Black Tern.

September was generally uneventful, except for a Montagu's Harrier at Cissbury on 2nd, a probable of this species at Long Furlong on 18th, Merlins at two sites, a Nightjar at Chanctonbury on 17th, & a Dartford Warbler at Hollingbury Camp on 1st. 3 Little Stints were noted late-month, & the summer migrants gradually disappeared, with few highlights.

October produced several sub-rarities, which were a Richard's Pipit with Meadow Pipits at Cissbury on 21st, a Kentish Plover on the River Adur at Shoreham on 16th, and a Sabine's Gull close-in on the sea at Worthing on 3rd. Peregrines were seen at Cissbury on 7th and Worthing beach on 22nd, and a Merlin was at the Sanctuary on 27th. Waders were again unexceptional, with a Little Stint on 7th, and a Jack Snipe at Woods Mill on 28th. A Longtailed Duck remained at Hove Lagoon from 30th into November and a Bewick's Swan flew east at Worthing beach on 21st as did 9 White-fronted Geese. Passerines included a scattering of Ring Ouzels, good numbers of Black Redstarts and Firecrests, Bramblings, Redpolls, more Crossbills, Tree Sparrows, and another large Goldcrest influx.

In November, yet another White Stork was noted in the area, this time over Shoreham on 15th. A Little Auk was on the tide-line at Ferring on 4th, a Scaup arrived at Widewater around 24th, and raptors included a Hen Harrier at Worthing beach on 4th, a Buzzard at Woods Mill on 21st, and a Merlin at Wild Park on the same date. Seawatching brought Red-throated Divers, a Slavonian Grebe, and an Avocet; late hirundines included a Swallow on 15th and 2 House Martins on 20th, both records from Woods Mill. Passerine highlights were scatterings of Firecrests, Redpolls, Brambling, Tree Sparrows and Black Redstarts during the month. A "northern race" Long-tailed Tit was claimed at Wild Park on 10th.

December often passes us by with few birds of note, but in 1990 this month proved very interesting indeed; no doubt due to a short cold spell mid-month and strong winds at the month's end. At Goring beach on 15th 2 Whooper Swans flew in to land on the sea, remaining there for over 1 hour; the first area record for many years. After a Little Auk at Worthing beach on 13th and 2 on 16th, an astonishing 8 flew past there on 29th; the species being noted in numbers at this time from many sites in eastern and southern England. 19 White-fronted Geese passed Worthing beach on Dec 10, & also noted there were Goosander, Velvet Scoter, 2 Long-tailed Ducks on 16th, and 3 Slavonian Grebes for the month.

Other notable species during December were 18 Shags at
Brighton Marina on 29th, a high number for this far east;
3 Merlins during the month; a Glaucous Gull at Shoreham
beach from 30th and 3 Purple Sandpipers there from 27th.
The occasional record of Black Redstart, Blackcap and
Chiffchaff was received. The year ended as it began, with
again 3 Snow Buntings, this time at Lancing beach, which
are still there at the time of writing (end-Feb 1991).
Finally a Franklin's Gull was watched briefly on 29th at
Brighton Marina, if accepted, our first record of this
great Nearctic rarity. So it was a rather exciting year
in many respects; 1991 has started well too, and hopefully
will continue as such!

"Downs" refers to the downland area between the Adur Valley and the A24 including Cissbury/Chanctonbury. References to Worthing Beaches in seawatching data include all seawatch sites unless separately identified. "Adur" refers to the river and associated mudflats between the footbridge and the flyover. Due to circumstances beyond their control, the Cissbury Ringing Group were unable to provide data at an early enough date for inclusion in the systematic list.

Singles were noted offshore there on Jan 9, 2 on Jan 20, 1 on Mar 4, and 1 on Apr 22. Peak movements were in Nov, with a group of 13W on Nov 27 (RJS), and in Dec with 11E on 15th & 12E 1 W on 16th.

Away from this site 1 was at Brighton Marina on Mar 10, & a juvenile present on the tideline at Goring Gap Dec 15.

 BLACK-THROATED DIVER Very scarce in the early and spring months, the monthly totals from Worthing beach were:-

Not noted away from this site; uncommon in 1990. A record from 1989 concerned 2 at Brighton Marina on 27 Mar.

3. GREAT NORTHERN DIVER None were recorded in 1990.

<u>DIVER SP.</u> Divers not specifically identified were recorded mainly from Worthing beach; the monthly totals were as follows:-

Peak movements were 11E on Mar 3, 14E on Mar 18, and 11E on Mar 22; last were 2E on May 25. Late year peaks were 24E Dec 15 and 2E 14W on Dec 31. At Brighton Marina 11E on Mar 18 and 5E on Apr 1.

6. LITTLE GREBE Again few noted at both ends of the year, there being no hard weather to bring an influx. The peak counts were 6 at Brighton Marina on Feb 10, and 3 at Cuckoo's Corner on Jan 21 and Feb 16 with 1 there Jan 12.
Otherwise, singles at Southwick Canal on Jan 22 and R. Adur (Shoreham) on Feb 10.

A pair present at Wiston Pond in the breeding season. In autumn/late year 1 was at Clays field pond, Steyning on Oct 30, 2 at Cuckoo's Corner on Dec 3, and 1 on R. Adur (Steyning) Nov 16 to Dec 19. None for the year were reported from the former stronghold of Widewater (SRA)- possibly the fact that it has dried out in 2 successive summer droughts could point to the cause.

7. GREAT CRESTED GREBE The monthly totals of birds seen passing Worthing beach were as follows:-

Noted offshore there with 3 in Jan, 6 in Feb, 3 in Mar, 3 in Apr, and a occasional single in autumn.

Away from this site 2 flew E at Brighton Marina on May 4, 1 offshore at Ferring on Oct 7, 11 offshore Worthing beach Nov 29, and 5 offshore Shoreham to Lancing in Dec. Additionally up to 5 offshore Worthing beach in Dec. A quiet year for this species, no doubt due to the prevailing mild conditions at both ends of the year.

- RED-NECKED GREBE There was just 1 acceptable record, of 1 offshore at Worthing beach on May 1 (many obs.).
- SLAVONIAN GREBE An exceptional concentration of 12 were noted offshore at Worthing beach on Jan 20, there being large groups noted at other Sussex sites at the time. 1 was again offshore there on Feb 16.

In the late-year singles were off Worthing beach on Nov 27, and off Widewater on Dec 15, 1W at Worthing beach on Dec 8 & 1 E there Dec 9.

1989 A record of 3 at Brighton Marina 28 March.

- 10. BLACK-NECKED GREBE None were record in 1990.
- 12. FULMAR The monthly totals from Worthing beach were as follows:-

Peaks were 6W on Jan 29 and 1E 24W on Feb 22, both during or after severe gales; 5E 34W 20 April, 15E 45W Apr 21, 15E 15W on May 2, 12E 1W on May 27, and the latest in June was 1 on 30th.

Inland records involved singles over Mill Hill on Apr 27, and over Southwick football ground on Jun 9.

17. <u>SOOTY SHEARWATER</u> 1 W at Worthing beach on the unusual date of Feb 4 (PMB) has been forwarded to SOS for consideration.

1989 8 km off Brighton Marina on Feb 1.

- 18. MANX SHEARWATER Few in 1990, the records being 4E at Worthing beach on Apr 6 with 3W on Apr 14, and 2E at Goring beach on Jul 1 with 1 W at Worthing beach on Aug 18 & 1E on Aug 19. 1W at Worthing beach on the unusual date of 28 Dec.
- 23. LEACHS' PETREL None recorded this year.

1989 7 Brighton Marina 25 Dec, with a small dark rumped petrel.

25. <u>GANNET</u> Again recorded in every month at Worthing beach, as shown in the following table:-


Groups in & around Shoreham harbour numbered 32 on Jan 27 & 17 on Dec 15. Flocks flying inland to roost were 35 over Widewater on Oct 22 and 45 there Dec 13. 42 were on an Upper Beeding pylon on Oct 25.

Only noted at Woods Mill in the early months, with 6 records of singles Jan/Feb.

27. SHAG In the early months 1 at Brighton Marina on Feb 3 with 2 there Mar 18 and 2 again Apr 1.

1 was offshore at Worthing beach on May 11, 1 flew W there on Aug 25, & 1 offshore on Oct 6. On Dec 29 a remarkable 18 at Brighton Marina, which is rapidly becoming a traditional site for numbers of this species. 1 flew W at Worthing beach on Dec 21.

- 37. LITTLE EGRET 1 flew E along the tideline at Worthing Beach on May 14 (PMB/JAN) details submitted to BBRC and if accepted will be the third area record. Of interest to observers, 1990 is the final year in which this species will be considered by the national rarities committee.
- 39. <u>HERON</u> As usual, the largest numbers outside the breeding season were at New Salt's farm/ Adur saltings where between 7 and 9 were present Aug to Dec. Singles were noted at Worthing beach flying east on Apr 6 with 2 on May 2, and 1W on Oct 17. Otherwise just scattered singles reported. There were 19 nests at the Wyckham Wood heronry.
- 40. PURPLE HERON 1E, then NW inland at Worthing beach on Apr 21 (PMB), if accepted by SOS it will be the fifth area record.

- 42. WHITE STORK An excellent year for sightings of this species. 1 flew over Worthing on Aug 1 (JAN) and 2E over Worthing (MP), Shoreham (KN), Southwick Hill (CJW), and Portslade (ECB) on Aug 24 were probably escapes from Whipsnade Zoo (which were reported in Dorset on Aug 23). 1 flew E over Shoreham on Nov 15. All details submitted to the SOS.
- 46. MUTE SWAN Early year counts were herds of 45 at Wyckham farm on Feb 10, and 35 on Upper Adur levels at Steyning on Feb 11, and 41 at Bines bridge on Feb 4.

A pair prospected Woods Mill lake in Apr but did not breed. A non-breeding flock of 36 was on R. Adur at Steyning on Jun 18.

Late year counts involved 42 at Bines bridge on Dec 9, 20 on R. Adur, Beeding to Stretham bridge on Dec 6, 18 Wyckham farm Dec 27, and 15 on the Upper Adur levels at Steyning on Dec 9. Unusual on seawatches but a total of 9 were recorded on 3 dates in September.

47. BEWICK'S SWAN In the early months 9 were on the Upper Adur levels at Bines bridge Jan 2, with 11 there (8 adults, 3 juveniles) on Jan 3, and 17 (11 adults plus 6 juveniles) there on Feb 4.

Lower down the river at Wyckham farm 8 (4 ads, 4 juvs) were present on Feb 3 with 4 there, and 5 at Stretham bridge, on Feb 4. Again 8 at Wyckham farm on Feb 10/11 but 15 (including 6 juveniles) noted there on the same day by another observer. Some duplication must be involved, as herds and family groups tend to wander.

In autumn 1 flew E at Worthing beach on Oct 21 (JAN), and 32 were at Bines bridge.

- 48. WHOOPER SWAN 2 adults arrived from the south to land on the sea at Goring beach on Dec 15 (DIS). This record has been accepted by SOS, and is the first locally since 1971. Later in the morning, they were seen flying E at Worthing beach.
- 51. WHITE-FRONTED GOOSE There were two records both from Worthing beach: 9W on Oct 21 (CH) and 19E on Dec 10 (JAN).

1989 30 Lancing 5 Mar.

 GREY LAG GOOSE Just one record of a singleton E at Worthing beach on Jan 26.

GREY GOOSE SP. 22E Worthing beach Dec 21.

55. CANADA GOOSE In the early months 26 were on the Upper Adur levels on Feb 10, 15 on the Steyning levels on Feb 10 with 11 there on Feb 11, and 11 Wyckham farm Feb 3. 2 were at Storrington Mill pond May 21 to Jun 4, and 2 flew E at Worthing beach on Jun 10.

A pair raised 5 young at Woods Mill.

After 2 on the Steyning levels on Aug 2, the only other records for the year were 12 at Clays field, Steyning, on Nov 3, and 2 at Goring on Dec 4.

- 56. BARNACLE GOOSE None recorded this year.
- 57. <u>BRENT GOOSE</u> Noted from Worthing beach up to May 27 and again after Sep 19, the monthly totals were:-

- 105. MONTAGU'S HARRIER An immature male flew W along the scarp of Cissbury Ring at 09.30 hrs on Sep 2 (CEH)- details forwarded to SOS. Additionally an individual probably of this species flew W over Long Furlong on Sep 18 (RJS).
- 108. SPARROWHAWK Again, numerous sightings during the year. In the early months (Jan to Mar), mainly singles noted from 9 sites, with 2 at Wild Park in Mar. A male arrived from the sea on Mar 31.

During the breeding season, a pair raised one juvenile at Wild Park, a pair raised 2 young in the Cissbury area; and probable breeding occurred at a further 10 sites.

Details of 9 confirmed breeding pairs were received with a probable further 8 pairs; and the species was present during the breeding season at another 13 sites. Where breeding success was noted, 5 pairs raised 11 young. For the second year running, 40% of pairs were in urban or semi-urban sites.

A male was found dead during the year by the A27 at Castle Goring, the only casualty reported.

- 118. MERLIN There were seven records for the year; these were all of singles in the last four months of the year, at Sompting brooks on Sep 8, Southwick on Sep 7 and Sep 13, the Sanctuary on Oct 27, Wild Park on Nov 21, Portslade on Dec 13, and Standean on Dec 23. 

264. STOCK DOVE In the breeding season 7 prs reported from Wild Park, 2 prs Stanmer Park, 1 pr Woods Mill, 1 pr Devil's Dyke, 2 prs Withdean Park, 3 prs Brighton Cemetery, and 1 pr Preston Park.

Counts outside this period included 32 at Falmer Hill on Dec 15, 23 on the downs at Sompting on Dec 27, 19 at Wild Park on Jan 13, and 11 at New Salt's farm on Apr 17. Smaller groups were noted from 4 further sites.

- 265. WOOD PIGEON Autumn movements included 1027 S at Sompting brooks on Oct 10 with 264 N there on Oct 18, and counts of 500 were made at Wild Park in Dec, and 100 Brighton cemetery, also in Dec. 3/4 pairs bred at Woods Mill.
- 266. COLLARED DOVE Many more counts received in 1990 than in previous years, and were as follows: 350 at Standean on Dec 1, 80 there Dec 22, 40 Goring hall Sep 20, 30 Ferring Rife Feb 16, and smaller groups noted from a further 8 sites.

Breeding records were 11 pairs Wild Park, 2 prs Southwick Hill, 4 prs Steyning High Street, and 2 (unsuccessful) pairs in a Storrington garden. Interestingly none were recorded all year at Woods Mill. A leucistic bird was noted in a W Hove garden in Mar.

267. TURTLE DOVE First of the year was 1 Shoreham Airport on Apr 17, after which only 7 in May from 5 sites. Breeding records were 1 pr Standean farm, 1 pr Devil's Dyke, 1 pr Southwick Hill, and singles in Jun/Jul at Stanmer, Coombes, and Woods Mill.

In autumn reported from Sompting brooks with 2 on Aug 26, 7 on Aug 28, 14 on Sep 12, and 7 on Sep 13. 2 were at Wild Park on Aug 15. Another poor showing gives cause for concern.

269. RING-NECKED PARAKEET Counts at Hollingbury Woods in the early months were a max of 9 during Jan/Mar. 1 pr attempted breeding but were unsuccessful. 1 was at Wild Park in Nov, with 4 in Dec.

GREAT SPOTTED CUCKOO An immature bird was reported on 4 Apr on the north side of Shoreham Airport, and re-located in the grounds of Ricardo's on Apr 5 (RAI/DIS). It stayed in the area until May 1, possibly May 3. It was the first for the area and only the second for Sussex; the first being a corpse found near Bognor in Aug 1967. For many, the bird of the year.



271. <u>CUCKOO</u> A rather late arrival, the first being noted at Woods Mill on Apr 16 and Wiston on Apr 17, after which a further 11 reported in Apr & early May from 10 sites. Probable breeding occurred at 5 sites.

Only 2 reported in autumn; 1 at Durrington on Aug 5 and 3 juveniles at Bramber on Aug 12, none being noted after this date. A poor year.

274. BARN OWL After years with few records, a bumper year in 1990. Proven breeding records involve 3 pairs with 8 nestlings ringed; sadly 2 already reported as road casualties by November. At one of these sites 3 adults were seen on one occasion. Singles during the year were at Wiston on May 2, 1 at Woods Mill on 7 dates Jan 11 to Jan 21, the first reserve record for over 10 years; 1 Upper Adur levels Jan 5 to Jan 26; 1 Michel Grove during July; 1 Beeding Hill Oct 22; 1 Buncton Nov 4; 1 Coombes Oct 19, Nov 1 & 2; and 1 found dead on the tide-line at Brighton on Feb 11.

Reports received of a pair introduced at Sompting brooks but no further details available.

After stating in the 1989 report that there " now seems little future for this species in the recording area", the recorder is delighted with this year's performance and hopes that it represents a true upturn in the fortunes of this magnificent owl.

279. <u>LITTLE OWL</u> Breeding records included a pair at Storrington raising 2 young, 1 pr Devil's Dyke, and probable breeding at Findon Valley, Nepcote Park, Coombes, Cissbury, and Small Dole.

Outside the breeding season a further 8 were reported from as many (different) sites; interestingly 2 of these were urban records from Worthing and 1 was noted in a "Kestrel" nest box at the Sanctuary on Jan 25, but not subsequently. 3 were ringed at Wiston.

- 280. TAWNY OWL Breeding season records were:- a pair again successful at Southwick, raising 2 young; a pair at Woods Mill raised 2 young; and pairs or singles noted in the breeding season at Michel Grove, Steyning, Coombes, Lancing Ring, West Worthing, Goring and Cissbury/ Findon Valley. A decline reported by the observer at the last two sites. Outside the breeding season singles were noted from just 3 further inland sites.
- 281. LONG-EARED OWL One downland roost was occupied at both ends of the year, holding between 2 and 4 individuals, birds being noted here on Jan 27 and Dec 22. Sadly, two casualties were reported; 1 found dead beside the railway bridge at New Salt's farm on Mar 31, and another on the roadside at Upper Beeding on Feb 28.
- 282. SHORT-EARED OWL In the early months, singles were noted at Sompting brooks on Feb 8, Shoreham Airport on Feb 11, possibly the same at Shoreham on Feb 15, and 2 on the Upper Adur levels at Steyning on Feb 3. Singles flew N at Worthing beach on May 6 and May 7.

Just one autumn record, of 1 flying S at Sompting brooks on Aug 27.

- 284. NIGHTJAR The single record for 1990 was 1 hawking at Chanctonbury Ring on Sep 17 (CJF).
- 289. <u>SWIFT</u> First noted were singles over Hove and Worthing on Apr 29, with singles at five scattered sites on Apr 30. Thereafter a general arrival in the first week of May with 500+ at Wild Park on 11th.

Breeding season reports included a colony of "many birds" in Eastern Avenue, Shoreham; nests at Storrington Church & Mill House; 3 pairs at Maybridge; and feeding flocks during this period included 100+ at Preston Park on Jun 12.

Pre-departure flocks were a total of 780 at Broadwater Jul 20- Jul 28, when a mass exodus reported; 70 Small Dole Jul 20; 50 Ferring Jul 29; 120 Withdean 27 Jul; after which few noted in August, the maximum being 6 at Lancing on 21st.

September records included singles at Broadwater on Sep 3 and Sep 4, Steyning on Sep 17 with 2 there Sep 18. The last were 3 late birds with Swallows at Sompting brooks on Oct 10.

- 293. <u>KINGFISHER</u> Another good year, with many records, and as usual most were from the Adur valley where mainly singles were regularly noted through the year from New Salt's farm, Shoreham harbour and R. Adur at Small Dole, Shoreham, Stretham bridge, Wyckham, Steyning, and Upper Beeding. 1 was killed by flying into a school window at Steyning on Sep 10, and a pair raised a total of 7 young at Woods Mill. Other records away from the Adur Valley were 1 at Clays field pond (Steyning) from Sep 10 to end-year, 1 at Brighton Marina in November, 2 throughout the year at Chantry Mill Pond, Storrington, and 1 at Ferring Rife on Nov 14. A single bird was ringed at Sandgate Park, Washington.
- 297. <u>HOOPOE</u> 1 at Standean farm, Patcham on May 3 (GLC et al). Details have been sent to the SOS.

1989 The individual at Hollingbury golf course was Aug 10, not Apr 10, as stated.

298. WRYNECK 1 was at Wild Park Aug 15 (PJW). Details have been sent to the SOS.

1989 1 in a Hove garden on May 8 (TA).

- 300. GREEN WOODPECKER Breeding season reports were as follows:- 1 pr bred Woods Mill raising two young, 1 pr noted feeding 2 young, Storrington Jun 20; and probable breeding at Cissbury/Lychpole (2 prs), Steyning, Findon Valley, Sandgate Park, Sullington Warren, Wild Park, and Devil's Dyke. Singles also recorded in the breeding season from Muntham Park, Coombes, and West Durrington. Outside this period singles reported from 9 further sites, including Goring Wood in Nov/Dec, Clapham Woods in Dec, and Brighton Cemetery in Nov/Dec. An average year.
- 301. GREAT SPOTTED WOODPECKER After an apparent decline in 1988/89, more noted in 1990. Breeding records were 3 pairs feeding young at sites near Steyning in Apr/May, and 1 pr bred at Woods Mill. Singles also noted in the breeding season at Wiston, Sullington Warren, Sandgate Park, Findon Park, and Wild Park.

Outside this period singles reported from a further 10 sites, which included Cissbury, Maybridge, Goring Wood, Clapham Woods, Storrington, and Stanmer Park. A better year.

- 302. <u>LESSER SPOTTED WOODPECKER</u> After 9 records in 1989, only 2 in 1990. These were singles, at Woods Mill on Mar 28 and Clapham Woods on Dec 5. Undoubtedly, there are more in the recording area but this species does prove elusive.
- 311. SKYLARK Few noted in the mild early months, the maximum being 100 at Standean farm on Jan 20.

Breeding records were few, but included 11 pairs at Devil's Dyke. Autumn counts included 387 Wild Park Sep 22 to Oct 31, max 40 on Oct 10; 201 at Sompting brooks on 5 dates in Oct, max 120 on Oct 13, and 100 at Standean on Dec 1.

To year-end, smaller numbers (<40) in Nov/Dec at Goring Gap, Widewater, Upper Adur Levels, and Brighton Cemetery.

313. SAND MARTIN First of the year were 2 N at Broadwater on Mar 18; very few others noted on spring passage.

Regretably no systematic counts of the Sandgate/Rock Common colonies was carried out. At the latter site 4 nest holes were still occupied on Jul 25. In autumn a total of 997 on 11 dates at Sompting brooks max 116 on Sep 13 and 750 (in 20 minutes) on Sep 17; and 34 Hollingbury/ Wild Park Aug 21 to Oct 13, max 24 on Sep 15. Last of the year were 3 at Sompting brooks on Oct 18.

314. <u>SWALLOW</u> First of the year were singles at Sompting brooks on Apr 2, over Worthing on Apr 3, and 3 at Shoreham Airport on Apr 9, after which most reports of arrivals were in the last week of the month, and in early May. The only breeding season records were pairs at Coombes, one of which raised 4 young in a garage, and another pair which raised 4 young in a stable.

Peak movements in autumn were a total of 15,449 at Hollingbury/Wild Park Aug 3 to Oct 26, max 5026 on Sep 4 and 8600 on Sep 15; 1000+ at Cissbury on Sep 13; at Sompting brooks, 155 on 4 dates, late August, 1446 on 717 dates in Sep max 275 on Sep 4, and 268 on 3 dates in Oct, max 180 on Oct 10; "hundreds" at Southwick on Sep 15; and small counts from various sites through October. November records were singles at Shoreham on Nov 2, Widewater on Nov 11 & Nov 15, 2 at Woods Mill on Nov 15, and the last at Mill Hill on Nov 16.

- 315. <u>RED-RUMPED SWALLOW</u> After a report from Widewater of a single on the late afternoon of Apr 23 (MC), 2 (one of which may have been the earlier bird) were seen at Brooklands in the evening (JAN). If accepted by BBRC, the first record for the area.
- 316. HOUSE MARTIN Another peculiar spring arrival. 3 were recorded at Broadwater on the early date of Mar 31, and there were certainly others seen in Sussex around this time; however, the main arrival did not appear to be until the end of April and the first week of May, when 1 was at Broadwater on Apr 25, with 60 there on Apr 30, 3 were at Southwick on May 3, 9 at Storrington on May 5, and 1 at Portslade on May 8.

The only breding record received was 5 prs in Sompting Road, Worthing. Counts of colonies, particularly under the eaves of houses in urban areas, would be most welcome.

Peak movements in autumn were a total of 18,313 at Hollingbury/ Wild Park Aug 3 to Oct 14, max 4010 on Sep 4, 11700 on Sep 15, and 900 on Oct 2; 1000+ at Cissbury on Sep 13; 1000+ at Brighton Cemetery on Sep 26; "hundreds" at Southwick on Sep 15; 1418 at Sompting brooks on 12 dates in Sep, max 327 on Sep 13; 300 Steyning on Sep 20; 240 W in 5 minutes at Broadwater on Oct 8; and smaller numbers at various localities through Oct. Last of the year, and the only November record, was 1 at Woods Mill on Nov 20.

- 317. <u>RICHARD'S PIPIT</u> 1 was reported with Meadow Pipits at Cissbury on Oct 21 (MS). If accepted by SOS, the first area record since 1956.
- 320. TREE PIPIT First noted with 1 N at Brighton Marina on Apr 1, after which 3 at Cissbury on Apr 16, and 1 N again at the Marina on May 5.

In autumn, 4 at Sompting brooks on 3 dates in Aug, and a total of 33 there on 5 dates in Sep. At Hollingbury/ Wild Park a total of 62 Aug 21 to Oct 14, max 26 on Aug 21; and at Cissbury 2 on Aug 8, then 12 there on 4 dates to Sep 15. Additionally, 3 at Newtimber Hill on Aug 27. Last of the year was 1 at Wild Park on Oct 14.

322. MEADOW PIPIT Groups in the early months were 50 on the Upper Adur levels (Beeding) on Jan 1, and 20 at Widewater on Mar 30. 176 flew over Wild Park Feb 17 to Mar 21, & 11 were at Hollingbury Camp on Apr 1.

No breeding records were received.

Peak counts in autumn were 658 Hollingbury/ Wild Park Aug 17 to Oct 31, max 38 on both Sep 15 & Sep 25, 45 on Oct 2, and 55 on Oct 525; 146 at Sompting brooks on 4 dates inOct; 300 Cissbury on Sep 20; and 25 at Widewater on Sep 27 with 16 there on Oct 8. In the late months 55 were at King's barn, Steyning, on Dec 24, & the Wild Park total for December was 25.

324a ROCK PIPIT 2 were at Shoreham harbour on Jan 11 and Jan 13, 5 at Shoreham beach on Jan 27, and 1 at Widewater on Mar 31.

In autumn and late-year, 2 were at Widewater on Oct 2, and singles at Ferring beach on Oct 27, Widewater on Nov 25, Goring beach on Nov 11, and Shoreham beach on Dec 13. A poor performance this year.

324b WATER PIPIT The singleton reported at Widewater in late December 1989 was regularly noted there until at least Mar 31 (SRA,KN,RJF et al) when it was joined by a second bird (DIS).

Another, or one of the above two, was reported there on Apr 5 & Apr 8 (RJF). All details sent to SOS.

325. YELLOW WAGTAIL First of the year was 1 NW over Wild Park on Apr 21, then 7 N at Brighton Marina on Apr 25, 2 N at Wild Park on May 1, and singles at the Marina on May 4, Cissbury on May 14, and W Hove golf course on May 20.

Autumn passage commenced from Jul 27 when 2 were at Widewater, then 20W at Broadwater and 1 at New Salt's farm on Aug 21 & 1 at Maybridge on Aug 27; 45 were present at Newtimber Hill, also on Auug 27, and between Aug 18 and Sep 24 a total of 76 were noted at Hollingbury/Wild Park, max 12 on Aug 24 and 15 on Aug 27.

Other concentrations noted were 20 at Cissbury on Sep 1, 25 there Sep 13, & 30E at Lancing on Sep 11. 1 at Woods Mill on Sep 1 was the first record for the reserve. Last of the year were 12 at King's barn, Steyning, on Sep 25.

327. <u>GREY WAGTAIL</u> In the early months singles noted on R. Adur(Steyning) Jan 2, in Steyning town centre on Feb 3, Queen's Park, Brighton on Feb 10, and at Woods Mill.

Probably bred at Woods Mill, where a juvenile was present in July. Otherwise just two singles in the breeding season, at King's barn, Steyning on Jul 20 and at Mill Hill on Jul 22.

First of the autumn was 1 at Cissbury on Aug 19 with another there on the 26th.

1 was at Sompting brooks on 8 Sep, and between this date and Oct 31 a total of
20 reported from 4 coastal and 6 inland sites, these being mainly singles.

November and December records all involved single birds; at Steyning on Nov 19,
Annington on Nov 25, and Withdean Park during the month; and in a Storrington
garden Dec 8 to Dec 15, Cuckoo's Corner on Dec 16, Woods Mill & Preston Park;
and on the downs above Sompting on Dec 27.

328. <u>PIED WAGTAIL</u> Counts in the early months included 130 Steyning Sewerage works on Jan 1, 50 at Brooklands on Mar 3, and 29 at Widewater Mar 14 and Mar 25.

Pairs noted in the breeding season were 1 pr Steyning, 2 prs with 5 juvs Starmer Park Jul 28, 1 pr which bred in the rubbish tip at Woods Mill, and 1 pr Devil's Dyke. Singles noted during this period were in a Coombes garden, and Worthing town centre.

Counts in Sep/Oct included 64 Hollingbury/ Wild Park Sep 22 to Oct 31 max 18 on Oct 19; 35 Sompting brooks on 6 dates in Oct; 22 Cissbury Oct 22; 18+ Coombes Oct 30; and 15 Widewater Oct 19. Few counts received for the later months, the maximum being 18 at Ferring beach on Nov 4. "White" Wagtails recorded were as follows:- 1 Brighton Marina Mar 18; 1 Widewater Apr 9; 1 Brooklands Apr 24; and in autumn, 4 at Sompting brooks Oct 13, 3 at Cissbury on Sep 23, and 2 at Hove on Sep 2.

331. WREN Counts in the early months were 68 Wild Park on Jan 13, with 81 there on Jan 17. Breeding season counts were 112 prs Wild Park, 47 prs Devil's Dyke, and 6 prs Woods Mill.

In the later months counts of 102 in Nov & 68 in Dec were made at Wild Park; also 56 Brighton Cemetery in Nov with 41 there in Dec, and at Withdean Park, 32 in Nov and 28 in Dec.

- 333. <u>DUNNOCK</u> 54 were counted at Wild Park on Jan 13. Breeding season counts were 59 prs Wild Park, 14 prs Devil's Dyke, and 4 prs Woods Mill. Counts in the later months were 53 Wild Park in Nov, 56 there in Dec; 21 Brighton Cemetery in Nov but only 5 in Dec; and 20 Withdean Park Nov with 22 in Dec.
- 336. ROBIN 104 were at Wild Park on Feb 17. In the breeding season, 125 pairs Wild Park, 49 prs Devil's Dyke, 4 prs Woods Mill, & 4 prs Southwick Hill. In autumn 104 noted on 7 dates at Sompting brooks in Sep/Oct. Late-year counts were

124 Wild Park Nov, with 74 in Dec; 55 Brighton Cemetery Nov, with 33 Dec; and 33 Withdean Park Nov, with 28 in Dec.

338. <u>NIGHTINGALE</u> First recorded at Woods Mill on Apr 21, after which a single singing at Brooklands, with 5 at Sompting brooks, 2 at Broadwater and 2 at Hillbarn, all on Apr 24; then singles (again singing) in a West Worthing garden on Apr 25, West Hove golf course on Apr 29, and West Durrington on May 3.

A mixed breeding season, the species not being reported from some traditional sites but present at several new ones. Males holding territory were as follows:2 Sompting brooks May 11, 1 Washington Woods May 26, 1 Adur (Steyning) during Apr/May, 3 prs near Woods Mill, and at King's Barn (Steyning) and Beeding Church. The stronghold appears to be in the Wiston area with a count of 13 pairs.

In autumn singles seen at Sompting brooks on Sep 3 and Sep 9. A total of 6 were ringed at Cissbury for the year.

342. BLACK REDSTART In the early months of the year, singles noted at Goring Gap on Jan 20, Widewater on Jan 22, Lancing Sailing Club on Feb 11, and Hollingdean Allotments Mar 18.

First of the autumn was 1 at Hollingbury on Oct 7, after which 1 at Truleigh Manor farm on Oct 16; 2 at Goring Rife on Oct 17; 4 Hollingdean allotments Oct 20; 2 Ferring beach Oct 22; 2 Highdown Oct 23; 1 Shoreham Airport Oct 26 & 31; and in November, 1 at Ferring on 7th, 1 at Shoreham harbour on 1st and 15th, & 1 at Widewater on 25th. Just one reported in Dec, a superb male at Goring Gap on Dec 1, moving to nearby Ferring beach from Dec 15.

343. <u>REDSTART</u> First of the year was 1 at R. Adur (houseboats) on Apr 17, after which singles at Shoreham Airport on Apr 25, Wild Park on Apr 26 & 29, Southwick Hill on Apr 28, and W Hove golf course on Apr 30.

A rank juvenile was ringed at Shoreham Sanctuary on Jul 29, giving rise to speculation that the species may have bred in the area.

First migrant of the autumn was one at Mill Hill on Aug 8, closely followed by another at Wyckham on Aug 12. Thereafter, a total of 73 noted to Oct 14, which included 40 Hollingbury/Wild Park Aug 18 to Oct 14, 14 at Cissbury on Aug 25, and 4 there Aug 28 and 4 again on Sep 13.

344. WHINCHAT First of the year were 3 at Hollingbury Camp on Apr 29, after which 1 at W Hove golf course on Apr 30, 2 at Wild Park on May 1, and 1 at Shoreham Airport on May 2. From this date to May 17, a further 15 noted from 7 sites.

The first returning birds were 1 at Goring Gap on Aug 6, and 1 at King's barn, Steyning on Aug 12 with 2 there Aug 13. From this date to the last on Oct 5, a further 123 noted, which included 42 at Sompting brooks Sep 2-Sep 9, max 19 on Sep 4; 36 Hollingbury/Wild Park Aug 17- Oct 5; 17 at Cissbury on Aug 28; and 7 at Sompting brooks Aug 28.

345. STONECHAT In contrast to 1989, many sightings between Jan/Mar involving a minimum of 15 individuals, mainly noted at traditional sites such as Widewater, Hollingbury Camp, Goring beach and Shoreham Airport.

There were 2 at the Adur Rec. on May 7, and 3 there May 12 - these birds were probably migrants. However, a pair was present in suitable habitat at Lancing Ring on Jul 26 and may have attempted breeding, or were very early migrants.

Noted in the autumn from Aug 29 when 2 were at Shoreham Airport, and from this date to end-Nov a total of 40 recorded from 8 inland and 4 coastal sites. These included 17 Hollingbury/Wild Park during Oct max 4 on Oct 6, 3 at Cissbury on Oct 14, and 3 at Widewater on Nov 15.

In December 3 were at Widewater on Dec 5 with 2 at W. Durrington on the same date, 1 Upper Adur levels Dec 6, and 2 at Goring Gap on Dec 16. A better year than usual but, yet again, all records would be most welcome.

346. WHEATEAR First of the year were singles at Hillbarn on the early date of Mar 1, then 3 at Goring beach Mar 11/12. A further 66 noted to the end of the month, most being in the last week, and include counts of 17 at Goring beach on Mar 28, 14 Adur Rec. Mar 28, 11 Shoreham beach Mar 31, and 13 Goring Gap Mar 31. Few noted in April, the monthly total being 20 only, max 8 at Goring Gap on Apr 30. Late arrivals in May included 4 at Hollingbury Camp on May 5, a pair at Widewater, a singles at Southwick Hill on May 2, Cissbury on May 14, & Devil's Dyke on May 16.

The first returning birds were at Wild Park on Aug 3 and 3 at Goring Gap on Aug 6, after which a further 34 during the month; the Wild Park autumn total of 122 between Aug 3 and Oct 28 (max 23 on Aug 21, 12 on Aug 24, and 29 on Sep 4) is not included in this or the other monthly totals.

The Sep total was a low 89, most of which noted at Sompting brooks, with a total of 70 there on 7 dates max 27 on Sep 2. 21 (out of the October total of 30) were at Somptong brooks on 10th. There were 2 records in November, of singles at Goring Gap on Nov 3 and in a Ferring garden on Nov 13. Again, a rather poor year, particularly the autumn months.

359. RING OUZEL First of the year was a male at Hollingdean on Mar 24 and a female at Broadwater on Mar 25. Not then recorded until 1 at W Hove golf course on Apr 29, 1 at Wild Park on May 1, and 1 at Hollingbury Camp on May 2.

As in 1989, few noted in the autumn, and all were in the last 10 days of October. 3 were at Goring Gap on Oct 22; and at Hollingbury/Wild Park 3 also on Oct 22 with 1's and 2's there on 5 dates to Oct 30, 9 individuals being involved altogether. 2 were at Cissbury on Oct 24.

1989 A few records to add were 3 Hollingbury Camp 2 Oct, & 4 East Brighton golf course 19 Oct.

360. <u>BLACKBIRD</u> Breeding records included 122 prs Hollingbury/Wild Park, 51 prs Devil's Dyke, and 4 prs Woods Mill. Counts during the year included 105 Wild Park Feb 17; increasing numbers Hollingbury/Wild Park from Sep 22, a total of 89 during Oct; 108 in Nov, and 102 there in Dec; 74 Brighton Cemetery in Nov with 66 in Dec; and 63 Withdean Park Nov with 54 in Dec.

364. <u>FIELDFARE</u> Counts in the early months included 250 Wyckham farm on Jan 1, 150 at North Stanmer on Mar 4, 75 Lychpole Hill on Jan 22, and 50+ Wiston on Jan 7. There were still 45 at Wiston on Apr 8, where late sightings are becoming traditional.

First of the autumn was 1 at Woods Mill on Sep 21, and peak counts in the period Oct-Nov were 257 NW over Sompting brooks on Oct 18, 150 No Man's Land Nov 11, 120 W at Steyning on Nov 1, 60+ at Woods Mill on several occasions, and a further 133 noted from 7 sites.

Numbers built into December when a number of high counts were made. These included 500 on the downs at Standean on Dec 1; 500 Beeding brooks on Dec 7; 230 on the downs at Sompting on Dec 27; 260 Standean on Dec 22; 250 Upper Adur levels on Dec 6; 150 Newtimber Hill on Dec 22; 100 south at Broadwater on Dec 29; and 100 Beeding Hill on Dec 22.

365. SONG THRUSH Breeding records included 14 prs Hollingbury/Wild Park, and 6 prs Devil's Dyke; 2/3 prs Woods Mill, and a pair raising 2 broods in a Southwick garden. A serious decline noted by several inland observers; in Storrington predation by Magpies was given as the cause. However, Woods Mill reported a slightly better year.

Counts during the year were 67 Hollingbury/Wild Park in Oct indicating an autumn influx; with much smaller numbers there Nov/Dec, and 39 Standean area on Dec 22.

366. <u>REDWING</u> Counts in the early months included 350 at Wiston on Mar 12, 200 Upper Adur levels Jan 1st, 200 Wiston Jan 7, 57 Woods Mill Mar 22, and groups of 10-50 additionally reported from a further 4 sites. 15 were still at Wiston on Apr 8.

First noted in autumn with "arrivals" at Woods Mill on Sep 27, and peak counts during the period Oct-Nov were 110 Hollingbury/Wild Park in Oct and 50 there in Nov, otherwise numerous sightings of flocks numbering 10 to 20. 100+ roosted at Woods Mill to the end of the year. Large mocturnal movements were noted over Goring on Oct 31, Nov 5, and Nov 15.

As with Fieldfare, many more in Dec, counts including 500 on the downs at Standean on Dec 1, 300 Upper Beeding on Dec 15, and 150 Newtimber Hill on Dec 22.

- 367. MISTLE THRUSH Breeding counts were as follows: Hollingbury/Wild Park 14 prs; Devil's Dyke 4 prs; and regular at Woods Mill, but no breeding occurred. Counts included 15 at Worthing Crematorium on Sep 30 and 14 at Withdean Park in November.
- 369. CETTI'S WARBLER 1, possibly 2 at Woods Mill Oct 11 to mid Nov (SC/DK/MR), the first record for the reserve.
- 373. GRASSHOPPER WARBLER The only spring record was 1 singing at Shoreham Airport on Apr 17. A pair bred at Devil's Dyke, and 1 was holding territory at Washington on May 29.

8 were ringed during the autumn at Cissbury, a good total for the site.

378. <u>SEDGE WARBLER</u> First of the year was 1 at New Salt's farm on Apr 17 and between 4 & 6 were reported at Shoreham Airport on Apr 27. 2 arrived from the sea at Brighton Marina on May 16, and the only spring sighting at Woods Mill was on this date.

Again breeding season reports were few. 6 males held territory at Small Dole on May 16, and 4 pairs present Patching Pond on May 7.

In autumn, just singles noted, at Woods Mill on Sep 3/4 and Sompting brooks on Sep 2, 4,& 5. Totals of 13 and 7 were ringed at the Sanctuary and Cissbury respectively.

382. REED WARBLER First of the year was 1 at New Salt's farm on Apr 29, but no other spring migrants reported.

2 males held territory at both Patching Pond on May 7 and Small Dole on May 25. A pair bred at Woods Mill, the first breeding noted for 7 years.

A "good autumn passage" noted from Woods Mill, the last being on Sep 26.

Otherwise few noted in the autumn, examples being 1 at Sompting brooks on Sep 9 and 3 near Shoreham Airport on the same date. A total of 33 were ringed at the Sanctuary, 26 at Cissbury, and 15 at Sandgate Park.

- 387. ICTERINE WARBLER 1 at Woods Mill on Aug 27 (SC/MR), if accepted by SOS will be only the second record for the area.
- 389. <u>DARTFORD WARBLER</u> 1 at Hollingbury Camp Sep 1 (PJW) was possibly the same as seen there on Oct 22/23. Details have been sent to the SOS.
- 397. LESSER WHITETHROAT First of the year were 3 at Wild Park on Apr 21, and at this site 6 were present on Apr 26 with 8 on Apr 29. Other April records were singles at Woods Mill on 24th, Sompting brooks on 25th, and W Hove golf course on 28th. 10 further individuals were reported in early May from as many scattered sites.

Breeding records received were 6 prs Wild Park, 5 prs Devil's Dyke, a "good breeding season" at Woods Mill, and a male holding territory in a Patcham garden from Apr 28 to Jun 23.

In autumn a total of 451 were noted for early Aug to late Sep. These included 186 Hollingbury/Wild Park Aug 3 to Sep 22, max 27 on Aug 14 and 21 on both Aug 17 and Aug 18; 107 Sompting brooks Aug to Sep 4 max 39 on Sep 2; 45 at Newtimber Hill on Aug 27; and 12 at Cissbury on Aug 25 with 25 there on Sep 13. Ringing totals for the year were 57 at Cissbury and 16 at the Sanctuary.

398. WHITETHROAT First of the year were singles at Woods Mill and in the Asda Car Park, Brighton, on Apr 14, after which singles at Coombes and Wiston on Apr 16, then a total of 54 from 9 sites in late Apr & early May. These included 11 at Wild Park on both Apr 29 and May 5, and 20 there May 4.

Counts of pairs or males holding territory in the breeding season included 25 Lancing Ring to Steepdown in Jun, 15 Wild Park, 19 Devil's Dyke, 6 Mill Hill, 16 Southwick Hill, & 4 Woods Mill.

In autumn from early Aug to Sep 22 a total of 1,100, many more than in previous years, were noted. These included 369 Hollingbury/ Wild Park Aug 3 to Sep 22 max 28 on Aug 22 and 68 on Sep 1; 103 Sompting brooks in Aug with 186 Sep, max 101 on Sep 2; 45 at Newtimber Hill on Aug 28; at Cissbury 12 on Aug 25, 17 on Aug 28, and 20 Sep 13; and 18 Worthing Gallops Aug 20. Totals for the year of 287 and 26 were ringed at Cissbury and the Sanctuary respectively.

399. GARDEN WARBLER First noted was 1 at Hillbarn golf course on May 1, after which singles at Wiston & Woods Mill on May 2, and 11 at 7 sites May 5 to May 12. Breeding season records were 7 prs Wild Park, 5 prs Devil's Dyke, and 2 prs Woods Mill.

In autumn, between early Aug and Sep 8 a total of 156 recorded, many more than usual. These included 65 ringed at Cissbury (with 17 at the Sanctuary); 22 Hollingbury/Wildpark Aug 3 to Sep 8; 21 at Sompting brooks in Aug max 15 on Aug 27, with 28 there in Sep max 17 on Sep 7; and 2 at Newtimber Hill on Aug 27.

400. <u>BLACKCAP</u> In the early months wintering singles were noted at Preston Park on Jan 27, in a Worthing garden on Jan 28 and Mar 10, and a Findon Valley garden on Feb 22.

Not reported again until 1 at Preston Park on Mar 23, which may have been the wintering bird seen in January; then 3 in Broadwater on Mar 24, 1 in Southwick on Mar 28, singles in West Hove and Wild Park on Mar 31, and singles at Steyning Round Hill and Worthing on Apr 1. A further 35 noted from 9 sites during Apr and early May.

Breeding records were 16 prs Hollingbury/Wildpark, 8 prs Devil's Dyke, 3 prs Woods Mill, and singing males at Withdean Park, Brighton Cemetery, and Hillbarn. A female was found dead in Storrington on Jun 27.

In autumn from early Aug to early Nov a total of 354 were noted. These included 216 Hollingbury/Wildpark Aug 7 to Oct 28 max 37 on Sep 11; 75 on 7 dates Sompting brooks in Sep; 40 at Cissbury on Oct 13; and a "good autumn passage" reported from Woods Mill. Late autumn sightings were singles in Goring Wood on Oct 28 and Nov 3.

Additional to those above were an exceptional 455 ringed during the year at Cissbury and 44 at the Sanctuary.

The only December record was 1 in a Broadwater garden 15-20 Dec.

408. WOOD WARBLER Spring records were 2 at Wild Park on Apr 26 and May 6, with singles there Apr 28, Apr 29, and May 1. There was 1 at Cissbury on Apr 28. Just 1 in the autumn and again at Wild Park, on Aug 26.

1989 1 was in Brighton on 10 Sep

409. CHIFFCHAFF In the early months 2 reported from Lancing gardens on Jan 13 and 1 was at Cuckoo's Corner on Feb 21.

First for the year and probable migrants were 1 at Woods Mill on Mar 3/4, 2
Lancing Mar 5, another Woods Mill Mar 10, and singles in Worthing on Mar 11,
Wild Park on Mar 12, Hollingdean Mar 12, Coombes Mar 13, the Sanctuary Mar 14,
Stanmer Park Mar 15, and a further 30 from 10 sites to end-month, at which point
the species was well-established.

A further influx occurred during early April when 26 reported, including 15 at Wild Park on Apr 14. Breeding season records included 9 prs Wild Park, 5 males holding territory at Brighton Cemetery, 5 prs Devil's Dyke, 3 territories held at woods Mill, and single pairs at Coombes and Sullington Warren; no doubt that, apart from these counts, the species was under-recorded during the period.

In the autumn, between early Aug and Oct 31 a total of 1060 noted. This total is comprised mainly from systematic counts of common migrants at Wild Park, where 762 were recorded Aug 3 to Oct 31, max 55 on Sep 4, 81 on Sep 22, and 56 on Oct 1; and at Sompting brooks where 169 recorded Sep 2 to Oct max 34 on Sep 3. Other concentrations were 50 at Cissbury on Oct 13 and 14, 50 through a Broadwater garden in Sep. An "excellent autumn passage" reported from Woods Mill.

November records were singles in Broadwater on Nov 3, Wild Park on Nov 5 & Nov 11, and Woods Mill on Nov 18. The only December sighting was 1 at Wild Park on the 9th.

Ringing totals for the year were 147 at Cissbury and 53 at the Sanctuary.

410. <u>WILLOW WARBLER</u> The first was a very early individual at Broadwater on Mar 17, but the only other record for this month was 1 at Wild Park on the more traditional date of Mar 31. Most arrived during April with exactly 100 reported during this month, including 39 at Wild Park on 28th, 20 Adur (houseboats) and 10 New Salt's farm Apr 17.

Breeding records included 28 prs Wild Park, 30 prs Devil's Dyke, 4 territories Sullington Warren, and 3 Small Dole.

In autumn between early Aug and mid-Sep a total of 1,043 reported, most from Wild Park and Sompting brooks. At the former site 651 noted Aug 3 to Sep 15, max 42 on Aug 17, 60 on Aug 18, and 48 on Sep 8; and at the latter site 80 in late Aug with 146 there Sep 2 to Sep 8, max 112 on Sep 2. Other noted counts were 50+ through a Broadwater garden in Aug, 35 Upper Adur levels Aug 12, and 60 Cissbury Aug 25. The last was 1 at Cissbury on Sep 23.

Ringing totals for the year were an excellent 894 at Cissbury, and 92 at the Sanctuary.

411. GOLDCREST Scattered singles and small groups noted in the early months, which include 7 at High Salvington on Jan 7 and 11 Wild Park on Mar 21. Breeding records were single pairs at Woods Mill; Stanmer Park (with 6 young); Steyning; Broadwater; and 2 prs Devil's Dyke. Males holding territory were reported from Preston Park, Wild Park, Storrington, and 5 flew over the Upper Adur levels on May 15.

Another large autumn influx, when between late Aug and end-Nov a total of 840 were noted, which include 509 Wild Park Aug 25 to Oct 31, max 59 on Oct 25; 201 ringed at Cissbury (peak of 58 on Oct 27); 100 Goring Wood Oct 27/28; and 21 at Sompting brooks on Oct 17. Additionally, a "large continuous autumn passage" noted from Woods Mill. As can be seen, the main influx occurred during mid and late October.

In contrast, few noted in December, the maxima being 8 at Wild Park and 6 in a Broadwater garden during the month.

412. <u>FIRECREST</u> Another excellent year for sightings of this species. In spring, singles were at Stanmer Park on Mar 2, Woods Mill on Mar 3/4, Broadwater

on Mar 14, the Sanctuary on Mar 14, Wiston on Apr 25, and 2 at Wild Park on May 6.

The autumn influx coincided with that of Goldcrest, the two species often being noted together. At Hollingbury/Wildpark there were singles on Oct 1, Oct 7, Oct 13, Oct 23, Oct 25 with 6 there on Oct 14 and 3 on Oct 25, and 1 during Nov. At other sites, singles recorded at New Salt's farm on Oct 14; 1 at the Adur footbridge on Oct 22; 2 at Goring Wood Oct 27 with 1 on Nov 3; 1 Coldean Nov 10; 2 Stammer Park Nov 14; and 3 were ringed at Cissbury during the period.

413. SPOTTED FLYCATCHER Only three incoming birds noted. These were singles at Cissbury and Wild Park on May 7, and Goring Wood on May 8.

Breeding season records were few and included a pair in a Steyning garden in June, which did not stay; 10 at Findon Gallops in early Aug, (adults still feeding young) and at least 2 pairs in Goring Wood. Any further breeding records would be welcome.

In autumn between Aug 20 and Oct 1 a total of 211 reported. Many of these were from downland above Sompting where 24 on Aug 26, an amazing 91 on Sep 2, 35 on Sep 3, and 30 on Sep 4. A total of 55 noted from Wild Park, max 18 on Aug 25 and other counts included 15 at Cissbury on Aug 20 with 6 there Aug 28, and a "good autumn passage" from Woods Mill, where the last was noted on Oct 1.

416. <u>PIED FLYCATCHER</u> Singles noted on spring passage at Wild Park on Apr 29 and May 5.

All autumn reports were from late Aug/early Sep; 1 was at Chanctonbury on Aug 24, and on the same date 2 were at Wild Park, where at this latter site 2 on Aug 25/27, and 1 Aug 28. 2 were at Sompting brooks on Aug 26.

418. LONG-TAILED TIT In the early months, 25 were noted from Wiston on Jan 3 with a huge count of 50+ there on Jan 7. Smaller groups of less than 10 reported from Storrington, Sullington Warren, Broadwater, Coombes, and Small Dole.

Breeding season records included 8 prs Wild Park, 2 prs Devil's Dyke, 1 pr Woods Mill, and probable breeding at Wiston.

Again plentiful during Aug-Dec, with 23 Sompting brooks Oct 17, 25 Woods Mill during the period, 30 Wild Park on Nov 11 with 18 there in Dec, 15 Waterhall Nov 2, and 12 Findon Valley Dec 11.

- 419. MARSH TIT Singles in the breeding season were noted at Woods Mill on Jul 3, and Highdown on Jul 5. Otherwise, singles and pairs reported from Clapham Woods, Highdown, Clayton Holt, Cissbury, and Stanmer Park, mainly Nov and Dec.
- 420. WILLOW TIT 2 at Wiston Jan 7 and 1 there May 1, and 1 at Cissbury Apr 16 were the only records.
- 422. <u>COAL TIT</u> Breeding records were of single pairs at Devil's Dyke, in a Broadwater garden, a Storrington garden, and "small numbers" at Sullington Warren.

Outside this period again reported from gardens with 1 in Storrington Jan-Mar & another present in Steyning all year. 1 was at Brighton Cemetery in Nov. Present throughout the year at Woods Mill, where it was described as an "avid bird-table feeder".

423. <u>BLUE TIT</u> Breeding counts involved 57 prs Wild Park, 14 prs Devil's Dyke, and 17 prs Woods Mill.

Counts outside the breeding season were 125 Wild Park Jan 13 with 75 there in Nov and 55 in Dec, 42 Brighton Cemetery in Nov and 28 there in Dec, and 41 Withdean Park in Dec.

- 424. GREAT TIT Breeding season counts involved 24 prs at Wild Park; 12 prs Devil's Dyke; and 7 prs Woods Mill in nest boxes, where one brood was eaten by a Weasel- having got inside and eaten 5 nestlings it took nearly an hour to gnaw its way out, as by that time is was too fat to exit from the original hole! Counts outside the breeding season were 65 Wild Park in both Jan and Dec, and 12 Withdean Park in Dec. Another partially melanistic bird noted from the Adur Valley: 1 at New Salt's farm on Jan 6.
- 425. NUTHATCH Few breeding birds noted; there were single pairs at Woods Mill and Devil's Dyke. Otherwise, 4 at Wiston on Jan 7 with 2 there Mar 2. Infrequently visted a Storrington garden throughout the year. 1 recorded at Cissbury on Aug 10 (where very unusual).
- 427. TREECREEPER A pair raised 3 young in a High Salvington garden and resident at Woods Mil, where probably bred.

In the early months singles noted from Cissbury (where unusual), Sullington Warren, Warminghurst, 2 at Stanmer Park, and 4 at Wiston. From Sep to Dec singles reported from Clapham Woods, Goring Woods (where 2 present Dec 30), Wild Park, Stanmer Park, and 2 at Stretham.

- 436. <u>JAY</u> Breeding records were of 2 prs Sullington Warren, 1 pr Woods Mill, and 2 prs Devil's Dyke. Counts of 7 were made at Washington on Apr 8 and Wild Park in Nov, with 4 at the latter site in Dec. Groups of 3 were at Small Dole on May 16, Brighton Cemetery in Nov/Dec, and regularly at a Storrington garden in Nov. Otherwise, just singles reported from a further 4 sites.
- 437. MAGPIE 30 prs bred Wild Park, 8 prs Devil's Dyke, 1 pr in a Storrington garden raising 2 young, and 1 pr bred Woods Mill. Counts outside the breeding season included 48 Wild Park Nov, 76 there in Dec, and at Brighton Cemetery 16 in Nov and 17 in Dec.
- 438. <u>JACKDAW</u> Breeding colonies reported were 6 prs Steyning, 3 prs in chimney pots, Hove, and breeding birds were being ousted from Downlands Avenue, Worthing, by prospecting Herring Gulls. Concentrations during the year were 350 Upper Adur levels Feb 10, and 36 Wild Park in Nov with 85 in Dec.
- 441. ROOK Rookery counts included 100+ nests Patcham Place, 22 nests St Mary's Church, Brighton, and 15 nests in a Steyning colony where " good fledging success " was reported.

Counts of 42 were made at Wild Park in Nov, with 76 in Dec.

- 442. <u>CARRION CROW</u> 6 prs bred Wild Park & 3 prs Devil's Dyke, but no other breeding records were received. Peak counts came from the Goring beach green/ Goring Gap areas, where concentrations of 50+ present all year; 74 were reported on Oct 22, and at Goring Gap 87 assembled to encircle a fox on Sep 8 (the fox retreated gracefully) Additionally, 28 were at Wild Park in Nov with 18 in Dec.
- 444. <u>STARLING</u> Roost counts involved 5000 at W. Hove golf course on Feb 4, 1500 Liverpool Terrace, Worthing on Dec 22, and smaller numbers in the Brighton parks. There were 500 on the Upper Adur levels on May 19. 10 prs bred at Woods Mill.
- 446. HOUSE SPARROW Counts of 50-60 made in the Brighton parks, Nov-Dec, & 3 pairs nested at Woods Mill.

- 448. TREE SPARROW Counts made during the year were as follows:- 7 at Wyckham farm on Feb 10, after which all records were from the autumn. 6 regular at Woods Mill Oct to end year, with 25 there end Nov; 9 Cissbury Oct 20; 2 Goring Rife Oct 17; 6 Hollingbury Camp Oct 7; 6 West Durrington Nov 11; and 6 Stretham on Dec 6.
- 451. CHAFFINCH In the early months there were 100+ at Greenfield farm, Steyning, on Jan 1, and 100+ Standean farm, Patcham, on Feb 20.

58 prs bred Wild Park, 36 pairs at Devil's Dyke, and 3 territories were held at Woods Mill.

No sizeable concentrations in the later months; counts included 57 Wild Park Nov and 55 there in Dec, 55 Standean farm on Dec 1, at Brighton Cemetery 33 in Nov and 25 in Dec, and 20+ Patching village on Dec 6.

452. <u>BRAMBLING</u> Few this year, the following represent all the records received: 1 was in a Worthing garden on Jan 7, 2 at Goring Gap on Mar 12, and 1 at Wild Park on Apr 26.

In autumn, 2E at Sompting brooks on Oct 10, 1 in Goring Wood on Nov 3, and 1 at Woods Mill on Oct 22, the first record for the reserve.

455. GREENFINCH Peak counts in the early months were 94 Wild Park on Apr 1, 65 Withdean Park Jan 15, 58 Brighton Cemetery Feb 16, 40 Storrington Jan 1, and 35 at Ferring Jan 28.

Breeding records involved 17 prs Wild Park, 1 pr Devil's Dyke, 1 pr Steyning (High Street), and 1 pr Woods Mill.

Late year counts included 200 Shoreham beach Oct 29, and 85 Wild Park Dec 2, 22 Withdean Park in Nov, 50 Goring Rife Oct 17, and 50 Lancing College Sep 5.

Smaller numbers were reported from a further 5 sites.

456. GOLDFINCH Maximum counts in the early months were 32 at Withdean Park on Feb 12, and 28 at Stanmer Park on Jan 18.

In April, small parties of <10 were noted daily over Broadwater. Breeding records involved 4 prs Wild Park, 2 prs Devil's Dyke, and 1 pr Woods Mill.

As usual, most noted in autumn, peak movements being 114E at Goring on Oct 17, 100 Widewater on Sep 26, 81 at Sompting brooks on 4 dates from Aug 14 to Oct 10, 50 at Waterhall on Aug 27, and to end-Oct a further 172 noted from 7 sites. Late year totals from Brighton parks were Wild Park, 27 in Nov and 32 in Dec; Brighton Cemetery, 10 in Nov, with 4 in Dec.

457. <u>SISKIN</u> Early year records were 1 at Woods Mill on Mar 11, up to 4 feeding on peanuts in a Storrington garden from Feb 6 to Mar 14, and 2/3 also feeding in peanuts in another Storrington garden from Feb 17 to Mar 10.

In autumn 4E at Sompting brooks on Oct 10, 17S at Broadwater on Oct 9, 6 on 4 dates in late Oct at Hollingbury/Wild Park, singles at Hollingbury Camp on Nov 5 & Nov 11, and 2 at Brighton Cemetery in Nov. One of the species quieter years.

458. LINNET Counts in the early months were 25 at Goring Gap on Jan 6, with 60 there Jan 20, 34 on Mar 11, & 11 at W Hove golf course on Apr 28. Breeding records involved 4 prs at Wild Park, a "disastrous breeding season here" (GLC); 16 prs Devil's Dyke, 4 prs Southwick Hill, and 1 pr attempted breeding at Woods Mill.

In autumn, peak counts were: - Sompting brooks, where 60W on Aug 26, then 94E on Aug 27/28, 194 E on 4 dates inSep, 74E on Oct 13, and 180E on Oct 14; Saddlescombe, 400 on Aug 27; Bevendean, 100 on Aug 27 and 200 on Oct 13; 320 at Mill Hill on Oct 14; and a further 148 noted from 5 sites to end-Nov. A mixed flock totalling 500 of this species and Goldfinch was at Shoreham Airport on Oct 26. The only December record received was of 38 at R. Adur (Shoreham) on Dec 14.

- 459. TWITE None reported this year.
- 460. <u>REDPOLL</u> In spring, singles reported flying north over Broadwater on Mar 21 and Brighton Marina on May 4.

Autumn records involved 13 at Hollingbury Camp on Oct 25 with 6 there Oct 27 and 2 on Nov 5; 6E at Sompting brooks on Oct 17; 4 Woods Mill Oct 28, and 17 Wild Park in Nov. A total of 22 were ringed at Cissbury where 1 was recorded on Apr 28 and 10 on Oct 27.

463. <u>CROSSBILL</u> The following are all the records: - 3 Cissbury on Jun 23; 9 flew E over Broadwater, calling, on Jul 15.(RAI); 2 N the Sanctuary Jul 22; 8 Cissbury on Jul 30, 1 there Aug 1 with 3 on Aug 7, 1 Aug 10, 2 Aug 15, 12 on Aug 16, 3 on Aug 24, 4 on Aug 25, 1 on Aug 28 and 8 on Oct 20 (ie a total of 46

between Jun 23 - Oct 20); "Crossbills" reported in pines at Lancing College on Aug 5 (BR), and 10 flew over Warren Hill NT (Washington) on Oct 17 (RJS).

- 469. <u>BULLFINCH</u> Breeding records included 3 prs Wild Park, 3 prs Devil's Dyke, 1 pr Woods Mill, 1 pr Sullington Warren, 1pr Southwick Hill, & 1 pr Hillbarn. Otherwise, singles and groups of up to 4 noted from a further 6 sites during the year.
- 494. SNOW BUNTING The group of 3 individuals reported at Shoreham harbour in Dec 1989 remained there until at least Jan 11 (many obs).

3 were located at Lancing beach green on Dec 23 (SRA et al), remaining there into the new year.

496. YELLOWHAMMER The few breeding records received were 13 prs
Hollingbury/Wild Park, 19 prs Devil's Dyke; 1 pr Woods Mill; 2 prs Goring Gap; &
a group of 6 at Southwick Hill on May 2.

The paucity of post-breeding flocks reported gives some cause for concern; the largest grops being 35 at Cissbury on Oct 24 and 20 Lychpole to No Man's Land Nov 11. Counts of all flocks (of these numbers and greater) would be welcome.

506. <u>REED BUNTING</u> Very few noted in the early months, just singles from a few scattered sites. 20 prs were noted along the R Adur from Bines Bridge to the Cement Works in the breeding season; 2 males were at Small Dole on May 25 and 1 pr bred Woods Mill; apart from the systematic counts the species was seriously under-recorded during the breeding season. Any counts of pairs or males holding territory would be welcome.

Late-year counts involved a roost of 100+ at Woods Mill, and just 6 singles from 2 sites.

510. CORN BUNTING In the early months 65 were at Standean farm, Patcham on Jan 20 and 62 there Feb 22.

Breeding season records involved pairs at 3 downland sites, and 6 prs Lancing Ring to Steepdown Jun 24, but no records received from some traditional downland sites. All breeding records would be welcome.

Late-year counts were 60 at King's barn, Steyning on Aug 11, 100 there Sep 16 with 80 Sep 26 and 130 on Oct 1. At Standean 21 were present on Dec 22.

"GREY PARROT" 3 sightings in Offington, Worthing in Nov/Dec.

BARBARY DOVE 1 with Collared Doves at Hollingdean on Dec 29.

SAKER FALCON 1 trailing jessies at Standean on Dec 22.

SHOREHAM SANCTUARY REPORT FOR 1990

The Society's sanctuary was visited on at least 37 occasions in the year; 19 of these were long visits for mist-netting. All the trapping and ringing was done between 12th May and 20th Oct during which time nearly 1000 birds were caught. The year was an eventful one from the meteorological point of view with a mild yet stormy winter and a long dry, often very hot summer. Like most of the recent years the copse was seldom visited during the winter months but during the migration periods and during the summer a more regular log was kept.

Thankfully the storms in January did no damage and it meant the "gardening" party on 11th Feb was able to get on with the perennial problem of osier coppicing. The workparty was very effective and the group of 15 members cleared two areas of osier on the west and north sides of the copse.

Spring came early and by 11th Mar at least 5 Goldcrests were busy singing and a splendid Firecrest was catching insects in the area of cleared osier on the north side. Three days later the first spring Chiff-chaff was singing. Bumble Bees were everywhere and a Brent Goose (a very unusual species at the Sanctuary) was seen flying eastward over Mill Hill. The first Willow Warblers were not heard until 5th Apr. a day when the celebrated Great Spotted Cuckoo also strayed briefly into the Sanctuary's recording rea. On 11th Apr the resident Mallard duck was proudly leading a brood of 12 ducklings, the streams were full of tadpoles and there was evidence of possibly two pairs of Bacgers in the area. Throughout the early months a pair of Sparrowhawks and Kestrels were regularly seen, 2 Turtle Doves, now a scarce bird at the Sanctuary, were recorded on 12th May, a passage Garden Warbler was trapped on 19th May and 50 Swifts gathered over the copse on 10th June.

The following table shows the number of some of the commoner resident species ringed during the breeding season and early autumn. When compared with 1989 the table shows how constant the numbers of Blackbirds,

Dunnocks and Robins are and suggests an increase in the productivity of Wrens and Bullfinches.

The summer was hot and dry, indeed in early August some of the highest temperatures recorded in Britain were being enjoyed. Although the water levels dropped considerably the main dykes still held some water which attracted small flocks of birds to drink. In the past these dry conditions would have attracted large charms of Goldfinches and flocks of Linnets to the streams but the ringing totals of only 2 Goldfinches and 18 Linnets suggest considerable reductions in the numbers of these finches in the neighbouring fields. The early passage warblers however were more numerous as the following table shows but the warblers normally passing through in September were fewer.

The total of 26 Whitethroats ringed was a record for the Sanctuary and the peak catches of other warblers were 12 Reed Warblers on 22nd Aug; 5 Garden Warblers on both 24th and 27th Aug; 29 Willow Warblers on 27th Aug and 27 Chiffchaffs on 16th Sept.

During late July the field next to the Sanctuary was the site for the circus; elephants were a "tick" for the copse. More natural, unusual records were 2 Crossbills and a Marsh Tit on 20th July, a juvenile Redstart in "spotty" plumage on 29th July, the two common woodpecker species on 8th Aug and a Jay on 22nd Aug. A second Redstart and a Kingfisher (the first for a few years) were

and a Marsh Tit on 20th July, a juvenile Redstart in "spotty" plumage on 29th July, the two common woodpecker species on 8th Aug and a Jay on 22nd Aug. A second Redstart and a Kingfisher (the first for a few years) were trapped on 27th Aug but the most curious record for that day was a Fulmar (Sanctuary first!) gliding along the hillside. No less than 5 Foxes were seen on 4th Aug, 2 small deer were seen on the hillside on 26th Sept and the count of Autumn Ladies Tresses was similar to 1989 despite the dry weather.

The later autumn migrants appeared from mid Sept with the first Grey Wagtail and Goldcrests recorded on 16th Sept, 2 Redwings on 13th Oct and 8 Redpolls on 20th Oct. Goldcrests were fairly numerous throughout October with at least 15 on most days usually seen feeding on the undersides of the Sycamore leaves. A small roost of 50 Linnets were on the hillside in late October. Chiffchaffs lingered on through the late autumn as 2 were still present on 11th Nov and singles on 14th Nov and 5th Dec.

As usual the staff of Southern Water Authority, particularly Mr Schultz, have been kind and cooperative and I express the Society's thanks to them. I would also like to thank those members who helped with the management tasks in the winter and with the mist netting in the summer and autumn.

RINGING REPORT FOR 1990

Ringing activities have remained high in 1990 as the grand total of 4118 ringed birds shows. Indeed the total is the third highest for the area (beaten only by 1980 and 1981 when large numbers of gulls were ringed) and maintains a run of 15 years with the total exceeding 3000. As usual the total of 148 ringed as pulli only represents a poor 3.6% of the total; furthermore 86% of these pulli were tits from nest-boxes however a brood of Kestrels, 8 Barn Owls and 2 Swifts were more exciting species.

For the first year since 1973 no gulls were ringed, this was due in part to the mild, often wet winter weather and to the completion of tipping at Sompting tip. In contrast the activities of the Steyning Ringing Group increased further with efforts spread over 4 sites. At Cissbury the total of 2858 included impressive catches of warblers. possibly increased by the use of tape-lures. These included 286 Whitethroats, 457 Blackcaps, 65 Garden Warblers, 997 Willow Warblers and 201 Goldcrests. The Barn Owls and 3 Little Owls were the main interest from a total of 367 caught at Wiston and a new venture to trap Sand Martins in a sand pit near Storrington yeilded 140 birds. The group's total of 3371 birds was completed by 6 birds trapped at the Mumbles, Steyning, All the Steyning Ringing Group information is processed on a computer by the group's secretary, Brian Clay, for easy analysis. At the Sanctuary the total was 667 and Dr Barrie Watson ringed 74 birds in and around Shoreham. The grand total was reached by a visiting ringing who ringed 3 birds on summer camp near Errringham Farm.

The following table shows the numbers of the 50 species ringed in the year; like the table for 1989 the figures in brackets represent the total at Cissbury

<u>RECOVERIES</u>: - the following is a selection of the more interesting recoveries and controls reported since the last ringing report.

1) . MEDITERRANEAN GULL: -

Both the Mediterranean Gulls handled locally by the Gull Group have recorded movements; the first in 1977 already wore a Belgian ring.

2).BLACK-HEADED GULL: during the year there were over 100 recoveries reported and 62% of therse were from other European countries. The distribution was from France (2); Belgium (1); Netherlands (7); Denmark (14); Germany (19)(12 from East Germany); Poland (1); Estonia (2); USSR (1); Norway (1); Sweden (5) and Finland (11).

Within the Britain the reports were from Sussex (20); Kent (5); Surrey (2); Staffordshire (2); Gloucestershire (2); and single birds from Cambridge, Essex, Dorset, Greater London, Hampshire, Berkshire and Devon. A detailed appraisal of movements of this species can be found in the Sussex Bird Report (1985).

- 3).COMMON GULL: the two recoveries, both in July, were from Norway and Sweden.
- 4).HERRING GULL: There was little new learnt from the 10 recoveries of this species; 4 from Sussex and single recoveries from Kent, Surrey, Suffolk, Hampshire and Dorset. The only foreign recovery was:-

- 5).GREAT BLACK-BACKED GULL: One local recovery in Shoreham (from Sompting) on 14-09-90 was nearly 10 years after ringing on 01-11-80.
- 6).BARN OWL: 2 owls ringed as pulli near Steyning were found dead by the roadside, both only a few miles from the nest site and both victims of collisions with motor vehicles.
- 7).SAND MARTIN: Two birds trapped at Sandgate pit in July were subsequently controlled at Icklesham, one just a week later. The following is the areas first foreing recovery of a Sand Martin presumably on its autumn passage southward through France.

- 8).SWALLOW: One trapped at Cissbury in late Aug was controlled at Icklesham (75km E) just 9 days later and one controlled at Wiston on 26-09-90 had been ringed in Buckinghamshire in 1989.
- 9).HOUSE MARTIN: a young bird ringed at Titchfield Haven, Hants in mid-Sept was tape lured at Cissbury just 6 days later.
- 10).PIED WAGTAIL: three Pied Wagtails which were caught and ringed in early Jan 1990 in a Chichester greenhouse and transported to be released in Shoreham because they were causing problems to the lettuce grower were later found dead, back in the same Chichester greenhouse. Another was found dead in Portslade in Feb 1990 and a ly female was controlled in Dyfed, Wales on 06-03-90.
- 11).ROBIN: There were two movements records; one ringed in West Worthing in Dec 1988 was killed by a cat in Woodingdean in Nov 90 and a juvenile ringed on Cissbury in June was found dead on the Isle of Wight in Aug.
- 12).BLACKBIRD: the most distant movement for some years; a juv female ringed at the Sanctuary in June 86 was killed by a cat in Guildford during Nov 1990.
- 13).REED WARBLER: a bird ringed in Aug 89 at Icklesham was controlled as a breeding bird at Sandgate Park in July.
- 14). GARDEN WARBLER: the following is only the second movement recorded outside Sussex, the first was from the same direction having been ringed in Powys.

15).BLACKCAP: - There were 9 movements of Blackcaps recorded, the most interesting and presumably on spring migration was: -

- 16).CHIFF-CHAFF: One ringed at Cissbury on 20-09-90 was controlled at Icklesham 3 days later.
- 17).WILLOW WARBLER: birds ringed at Diss, Norfolk in July 1989 and at Bullbrook, Staffordshire in Aug 1990 were controlled at Cissbury, the second only 3 days later on 22-08-90
- 18).GOLDCREST: -

Interestingly this bird was on Cissbury on the same day as the control reported last year from the east coast!

19).STARLING: - The only notable recovery involved an adult female ringed in Worthing during Feb 1987, this bird was caught in a shed and released in Feb 1989 in Boxmeer, Netherlands and was found dead, also in Boxmeer having been killed by a cat on 19-05-90.

As usual there were several local recoveries and retraps all which help understand the life histories of the area's common birds.

STEYNING RINGING GROUP REPORT 1990

The year started as usual during the winter with maintenance work at the main ringing site at Cissbury. This involved keeping the pathways clear and reducing the height of the scrub in the area adjacent to the net rides to increase the catching potential of the nets and maintain the vigour of the bushes. In addition a new net ride was cut. This ride complements the existing nets by running from midway up the slope to the very top thereby ensuring that the whole slope from bottom to top is at some point covered by a net ride.

Technological developments were also taking place. It was already known that birds could be attracted by replaying tapes of their song. Some initial attempts had been made during 1989 with domestic tape cassette machines which indicated that better reproduction would considerably improve the performance of this technique. New machines were developed to run off long life batteries using a variety of new and cannibalised components and assembled within a purpose built cabinet by Chris Fox's neighbour, to whom we are extremely grateful. The machines were field tested during March/April and resulted in the ringing of three Little Owls and the identification of many previously undetected Little Owl territories in the Wiston Area. I should add that the British Trust for Ornithology do issue strict guidelines for the use of tape machines when replaying bird song or calls and these are strictly followed by the Ringing Group.

Traditional ringing activities commenced in January 1990 at our Wiston feeding station. Tits and finches form the majority of the catch but other woodland species such as Great Spotted Woodpecker, Nuthatch and Treecreeper also visit.

In April activities moved to Cissbury and continued through to November with ringing taking place on 20 days in August alone a substantial increase on previous years. The tapes were brought into action at the beginning of August when breeding had ceased and migration was under

way: they immediately proved their worth. The target species were the warblers and Willow Warblers responded particularly well resulting in catches of 111 on August 6th, 91 on the 7th and 87 on the 22nd and a grand total for the year of 894 at Cissbury. The totals of other species, particularly those moving mainly in August such as Whitethroat, Lesser Whitethroat and Garden Warbler also doubled and there was a better sprinkling of Grasshopper Warblers, Redstarts and Nightingales.

However we did not have it all our own way as, untypically for the site, September proved to be disappointing, as numbers of Chiffchaffs were well down on the previous year and Blackcap numbers were not exceptional apart from 107 on the 8th September. Things improved again during October and a later movement of Goldcrests (58 on Oct. 27th and 33 on Nov. 3rd) with 3 Firecrests considerably raised spirits. The tapes again proved their worth luring 126 House Martins during September and as a final treat, 22 Redpolls during October and November.

Observations from the ringing site at Cissbury are detailed in the Systematic List but highlights included Quail, Wood Warbler, Crossbill, Greenshank, Grey Plover, Green Sandpiper, a Nuthatch (new for the site), the usual Tree Pipits in August and a Peregrine on 7th October spotted by two visitors but missed by the ringers!


A new venture for the Group was a series of ringing sessions at Sandgate Park, near Storrington, which resulted in catches of 85 Sand Martin and 33 Pied Wagtails; the former responding to tapes and the latter at roost. With limited time at our disposal these catches only realised some of the potential of the site. The ringing recoveries detailed in the Ringing Report such as the Sand Martin retrapped in France 3 weeks later or the Pied Wagtail caught in the autumn roost that had fledged in May in Norfolk from a brood of three, indicate not only an exiting future for the site but also the value of the ringing programme.


Reports of birds rung by other ringers and subsequently retrapped at Cissbury or Cissbury birds later found elsewhere are also detailed in the Ringing Report, but the total of 17 birds "controlled" (the technical term for birds caught that already bear rings and are re-released) or found dead is our highest ever annual total and included 8 Blackcaps showing the importance of Cissbury for this species. 13 of these birds were caught by ringers and released and 4 were found dead, 3 killed by cats!

A similar unfortunate fate met the Barn Owls that were rung as nestlings in the Wiston area under special permit. 2, both from the same brood of 4, were hit and killed by cars on local roads within 5 months of leaving the nest.

Despite this one depressing outcome, overall the Group had their most successful season to date and the team of 8 ringers now involved can feel well pleased. Grateful thanks are due to the three landowners of the sites we use without whose permission and co-operation our activities would not be possible.

SEAWATCHING REPORT FOR 1990

Introduction.

During 1990 the sea was watched for 515 hours when a total of 47,750 non-passerine birds noted: many passerines were also observed during offshore watches. Although coverage was less than 1989 the sightings were noteworthy of a report. As usual the spring months were most popular with watchers (although other seasons were also very productive) with over 75% of the total non-passerine birds noted during this period. As in previous years a daily log was passed around the observers, keeping them informed and saving much time collecting records.

As before most observations took place from the shelter opposite Marine Gardens, West Worthing but watches are included from other sites such as Ferring beach, Goring beach, Worthing pier, Brooklands beach and Widewater.





Chronological Report

The early part of the winter was mild and dominated by a strong westerly airstream bringing wet and windy weather in from the Atlantic, including storm force winds on 25th January. These conditions prevailed until mid February when some warmer, calmer days occurred.

Not surprisingly sea passage during the windy weather was dominated by Kittiwakes; over 1000 were noted in the first two months alone. Peak passage occurred in the stronger winds: 71E on 3rd, 101E on 10th (a day which also produced 13 Pochard), and 198W on 27th being the best day counts. Otherwise a single Greylag Goose, Velvet Scoter and 3 Great Skuas on the days following the storm were the main interest. Calm weather on 20th January gave an opportunity to observe birds feeding offshore with counts of 2 Red





Throated Divers, 3 Great Crested Grebes, 1 Red-necked Grebe and 12 Slavonian Grebes: the maximum count of 64 Red-breasted Mergansers was on 16th February. During this month similar species were seen in the windy conditions: Kittiwakes peaked with 154W on 4th and 230E on 22nd; the former date also producing reasonable movements of Fulmars, Gannets and auks, while 4 Little Gulls were rather less expected. The month ended with sightings of single Glaucous and Mediterranean Gulls.

March started slowly with a few skeins of Brent Geese passing east, but it was not until the weekend of 17th/18th when warm south-east winds occurred inducing small numbers of geese and ducks to pass, along with the first Sandwich Terns and more Little Gulls. Other notable sightings included 15 Velvet Scoter, a Golden Plover, and early Arctic Skua and Whimbrel. The remainder of the month was generally quiet until the momentum of the spring returned on the last day, when in a moderate south-east wind an exceptional wildfowl passage occurred. The expected Common Scoter only mustered 332, but 529 Teal, 279 Pintail and 330 Shovelers provided the main excitement. Also noted were 4 Gadwall, 2 Velvet Scoters, 7 Avocets, a Black-tailed Godwit, Great Skua and more Little Gulls and terns, including the first "commics".

This movement continued into early April with the 1st producing the spring's peak of Brent Geese (1446) and Common Scoter (1021) along with 156 Sandwich Terns, an arctic Skua and 2 Mediterranean Gulls. Another two of this species were seen the following day as well as a single Avocet and Great Skua. During a strong easterly airstream on 6th a good early passage of 3 Arctic and 8 Great Skuas occurred but 4 Manx Shearwaters and 5 Goosanders were very unexpected. Following this there was very little sea passage until 13th when a front moving east across the country pushed birds inshore including 10 Velvet Scoters and Great (4), Pomarine and Arctic Skuas. The advent of north-east winds on 20th brought a large up-channel passage of Gannets, with 130 noted along with a Black Tern. The expected Bar-tailed Godwit passage was seen on the following day when 1087 were recorded along with a

variety of other waders. The final days of the month saw anticyclonic weather set in and migration visibly increasing; Mediterranean Gulls were regularly seen along with the first few Greenshanks and Common Sandpipers. Little Gulls were particularly numerous at the end of the month with 69, 45 and 24 recorded on the final days. The first sea-watch record of a Mandarin occurred on the 29th, a day when a flock of 47 Pomarine Skuas passed eastward.

Early May is often said to be the best time to watch offshore passage from Sussex, and this year was no exception with over 13,000 birds noted passing up-channel. The settled anticyclonic weather provided ideal conditions for observing terns and waders: Avocets were seen on three dates, including a flock of 15 on the 4th, Greenshanks and Common Sandpipers were regular and scarce seawatch species such as Spotted Redshank and Ruff were recorded. The common shoreline waders also appeared in good numbers with Knot peaking at 101 on 2nd, Bar-tailed Godwits on 4th (802) and 52 Turnstone on 1st. Skuas were often noted but in small numbers, however Little Gulls surged passed with 255 recorded in the first week which included a peak of 112 on 1st, a day which also produced the seasons peak of 61 Black Terns and a Red-necked Grebe. Little Terns were also recorded in above average numbers, exceeding 100 on 5 dates and the peak movement of 180 seen on 4th. Commic terns were regular but no huge movements were noted; the peak of 810 recorded on 2nd May. Generally the remainder of the month saw little passage, although the return of south-easterly wind between 13th -15th saw more terns, skuas and waders. The 14th produced what was undoubtedly the seawatch bird of the spring in the form of a Little Egret which flew up-channel along the tide-line, while the supporting cast included 39 Velvet Scoters and a Roseate Tern. However from then on passage was on a meagre scale.

June and July were mainly settled with many hot sunny days. Sea-watching was, as usual, unrewarding: a few terns were observed along with some returning waders, while 2 Canada Geese and a Black Tern were good sightings in June, July commenced with 2 Manx Shearwaters being observed, but then was quieter with few birds noted.

August opened hot and sunny and remained that way for most of the month excepting Atlantic depressions that passed east over the country in the middle of the month. Terns were the flavour of the month with the first wave of "commics" at the end of the first week along with some Little Gulls and a single Black Tern, The depressions on the 15th and and 19th produced some of the best birding of the month, with 56 Gannets noted on the former date, while the latter saw many returning waders: 120 Dunlin, 35 Sanderling and 44 Ringed Plover being the best counts. Other good records were 5 Curlew Sandpipers, a single Pomarine and 3 Arctic Skuas and 200+ "Commic" terns.

Northerly winds saw September in, pushing good numbers of terns past during the month. The evening of the 4th saw the peak movement of the autumn with 296 passing westwards, although birds continued to pass until the end of the month. The settled summer weather began to break in the second half of the month with some wet and windy days inducing Gannets to pass: peaks were 83 on 19th, 113 on 29th and 97 on 30th. During this period a variety of wildfowl and waders were observed along with 28 Little Gulls on 28th. Throughout the month passerines were passing, the best day being 26th when over 2000 hirundines were noted.

October continued much as September left off with the same species but in smaller numbers. The windy weather of the 3rd provided a sighting of a Sabine's Gull offshore, but sea passage was then slow until a a run of moderate to strong south-easterly winds later in the month. However, passerines featured highly in mid-month; 1038 Goldfinches and 388 Linnets were recorded during the month and 2 Snow Buntings flew by on 7th Oct. Towards the end of the month wildfowl became more prominent, with scarcer species such as Pintail, Bewick's Swan and White-fronted Geese accompaning the more usual Brent Geese and Shelduck.

November opened promisingly with the season's peak of 510 Brent Geese, 130 Dunlin, a Goldeneye and a ring-tailed harrier on the 4th. Thereafter the month was quiet with



little or no passage observed; a Slavonian Grebe and 13 divers on 27th were the only sightings of note. The cold snap in early December induced a small offshore movement with 60 Wigeon, 18 Lapwing and 19 White-fronted Geese passing on the 10th. However the cold air was soon replaced by a warmer, wet and windy south-westerly airstream which lasted until the months end. These conditions saw large numbers of birds passing, as illustrated by the monthly totals of 147 divers, 436 Kittiwakes and 397 auks. Associated with these movements were Little Auks with 11 recorded; the peak of 8 on the 29th, while other notable species seen were Goldeneye, Goosander, Whooper Swans (2 on 15th), a Manx Shearwater (west on the 28th) and a Shag: a fitting end to another eventful sea-watching year.

NEW BIRDS FOR THE AREA - WHAT NEXT?

After a number of species were added to the SDOS area list in 1990, I am making no excuses whatsoever for indulging in a little harmless speculation on what new birds may be recorded in the next few years. This is not meant to be erudite, scientific, or even serious but hopefully will provide some discussion.

For its size, our area has recorded a surprising number of species over the years. Recent additions have been both expected and unexpected, for example Honey Buzzard in 1985, with another in 1986 was long over due, but who of us could have predicted Great Spotted Cuckoo? Nationally, vagrants and overshooting breeding birds a southern origin have increased over the past two or three years, some dramatically (eg. Little Egret); predictions, therefore have a heavy southerly/south-easterly bias!

Great Shearwater Still considered an outsider this far up-Channel, but sightings particularly from Kent and the east coast give grounds for at least a little optimism. Local seawatchers may just pick this one up on an autumn seawatch but, unless it sits on the tideline (most unlikely) it will never be easy, especially if the wind blows SW 8! It will be a fly-by and entirely unexpected.

<u>Little Shearwater</u> The possibility of this still-great rarity occurring is remote, almost as likely as recording an albatross; however, a lucky observer in Dorset noted this species and Black browed Albatross on the same day in 1989, off Hengistbury Head, so anything is possible.

A close bird in good light, and a prolonged view (particularly noting the flight pattern) would seem essential requirements for acceptance - flight is usually "flappier" than Manx Shearwater, but beware auks!

<u>Great White Egret</u> The SDOS has done well for rare herons over the years, notably Little Bittern, Night Heron, Cattle Egret, and Squacco Heron; but as yet, not this one. A once-great rarity, sightings show an upward trend

nationally, perhaps due to a northwards extension of its breeding range. With one at Pagham in 1990, it is a real possibility; perhaps passing offshore, or on the River Adur?

Black Stork A few years ago I would have regarded the addition of Black Stork as being almost out of the question. However it has extended its breeding range (now in Belgium) which may have given rise to the significant national increase in sightings, a number of which have been in the South of England. When it comes, it will probably be at a height, in the air, or possibly on the Adur levels; keep an eye on the sky!

Ferruginous Duck Although ot a BBRC rarity, I'm not entirely surprised that it has not been recorded, given its habitat preferences. We lack large areas of redfringed open water and believe me, it does like to skulk in reeds! Still a possibility, though; perhaps Wiston Pond, or just dropping for a few hours at Brooklands?

Black-winged Stilt This one is long overdue. Most likely to be seen on a spring sea-watch (what a sight - just imagine it!) or perhaps on the R. Adur or Widewater (flood arch would not be a bad site). Not so many around in 1990, apparently, but previous years have been good and have involved confirmed and attempted breeding in the UK.

White-rumped Sandpiper No real evidence of a national increase in sightings but this rare nearctic vagrant is annual in small numbers. Tends to turn up at Pagham occasionally. We've had Baird's, why not White rumped? Again, Widewater or R. Adur would seem most likely; and with Dunlins.

Long-billed Dowitcher Another long-shot, but does appear annually in small numbers, and at well-scattered, often unlikely sites. Sometimes winters so may hang around long enough for someone to find and identify it. In winter plumage, a little like a grey Snipe, with "sewing machine" feeding action, and more elegant than some field guides depict it - it is also surprisingly small.

Wilson's Phalarope Tends to be almost plentiful nationally (in rarity terms) during some years, and absent in others. It has been recorded in Sussex in recent years but still must remain an outsider for our area. Widewater seems one of the most likely locations (it's the one phalarope that's seen most often out of water) rather than, for example, Shoreham harbour. Bill length alone splits it from other phalaropes and it is larger; if you can't see the leg colour, it often bears an uncanny resemblance to a small winter-plumaged Spotted Redshank with no wing bars either.



Icterine Warbler

Icterine Warbler Suspected, but not yet recorded, and possibly one of the strongest candidates. Potential "hippolais" warblers do cause the inexperienced (and at times, the experienced) observer identification problems. Reed Warbler is often mistaken for this species or Melodious Warbler, and bright yellow juvenile Willow/Chiffs are sometimes mis-identified. I find that the most reliable feature when faced with a "hippolais" is the closed wing: Icterine is long winged with a prominent long pointed primary extension whereas this feature is lacking on Melodious, the wing being much shorter and round-ended. The pale wing panel is always or nearly always noticeable on Icterine whereas it is more subdued, and at times almost absent on Melodious. Field guides often stress Icterine's head-shape as being more peaked, and this is true, but often difficult to determine, unless the head is at the right angle and it stops moving. Both species are thick-billed.

Subalpine Warbler Again, a long-shot, but does turn up regularly and produces a surprising number of records in most years. More would undoubtedly be found if it wasn't such an appalling skulker; the song, although unmistakeably a "sylvia" is different and should attract attention (not as much as Orphean Warbler but I'll leave that tale for another day). Spring males are bright and easy to identify, given a good view. Autumn birds are difficult. A little coastal gorse scrub would help this one's chances.

<u>Pallas' Warbler</u> Wishful thinking? Perhaps not. We've had a few "near misses" in recent years, this species having occurred both just east and west of the recording area. Described as a "gem", and not without foundation but can be difficult to locate, even in a small copse. Tiny, hyper-active, and brilliant please let me know if you find one! Wild Park Hollingbury, or perhaps the Sanctuary or Goring Wood seem the most likely localities, from mid-October into December.

Greenish Warbler Less likely to occur than the above, but still a possibility Now breeds in NE Germany. A good prolonged view is vital; it is remarkably Chiffchaff-like in jizz with a simple short (but in fresh plumage) noticeable wing-bar but feather abrasion can reduce this feature considerably; so beware of Chiffchaffs with a faint wing bar! A "BBRC" job and not easy to get . accepted. Preferably it will have the good grace to drop into a mist net, and when a camera is on site.

Red-breasted Flycatcher Experience of this species should be a fundamental requirement for acceptance. Why? Each year, nationally, poorly-seen Robins are turned into Red breasted Flycatchers by observers who have yet to see the latter- once seen, never forgotten. A Robin with a cocked tail and drooping wings does look remarkably similar, as long as you ignore the red breast and larger size.

This is one of my favourites; not being brightly coloured but has such "charisma". It must come some day (in fact I've heard of a strong claim from Wild Park this year)-perhaps in Goring Wood, although JAN's garden would be just as likely! or any garden with a mature orchard.

Penduline Tit We lack habitat for this species, but not entirely. They like to feed on bullrush heads, and we do have bullrushes. A significant increase nationally over the last few years in records, from its previous exceptionally rare status; may well have bred already, and is expected to colonize many suitable habitats. I feel that this won't be long coming. The adult looks like a miniature Red backed Shrike, but watch out for the plainer juvenile in autumn.

Red-eyed Vireo There's nothing like controversy is there! I had to throw this one in, but agree that it is most unlikely. However, it is the most numerous American passerine to be recorded in the UK, albeit still no more than a handful but now being recorded annually in the west.

Anyone finding a vireo in our recording area has my eternal gratitude. Now I've got this far, I may as well stick my neck out further; although nationally rarer, I have a suspicion that, in Sussex at least, Northern Parula will turn up first. It's made its way to Portland and Hengistbury Head in recent years, why not a little further eastwards?

In conclusion, I will no doubt enjoy being proved totally wrong when none of the above materialize in the next few years.

FIELD OUTING REPORTS 1990

<u>Plst January</u>- 13 members took part in the opening trip of the year to Amberley Wildbrooks, which was led by Bernie Forbes. Good numbers of Wigeon, Teal, and Shoveler were present on the pool by Greatham Bridge. The star bird of the day was a juvenile Peregrine, flying west over the River Arun. Two Bean Geese of unknown origin were observed on the brooks towards Rackham. Rackham Woods were later visited where the usual woodland species were seen, including 5 Siskin feeding in the Alders.

18th February- Richard Ives led a party of 10 members on a circular tour of Thorney Island. Female Goldeneye and Red breasted Mergansers were abundant in the harbour and there were large numbers of Wigeon in the fields beside The Deeps. At the southern end of the island an Avocet was picked out amongst the enormous flock of mixed waders. The eastern side of the island provided the most interesting part of the trip with 4 species of grebe being observed togetherthe highlight being two Red necked Grebes, one in winter plumage and the other attaining summer plumage. A highly successful day with good numbers of waders, geese, and grebes.

31st March- A good turn out of members were led by Dave Smith along the coast from Goring Gap to Ferring Rife. Whilst seawatching at various points, a good number of duck was seen including Common Scoter, Shoveler and Teal. The rarest species observed was two Velvet Scoters amongst a flock of Commons. At least 8 Wheatears were present in the fields to the west of the Ilex Woods. The Rife itself was very quiet, with little seen apart from Reed Buntings and Meadow Pipits. Several Sandwich Terns were also seen passing east offshore.

29th April- On a calm and hazy morning 11 members found John Newnham at Goring Gap shelter for a seawatch. The movement of waders and terms over the period was very slow. Of interest were 3 Dolphins which were seen at a reasonable distance off shore. A strange term seen at about 9.00 caused pulses to quicken, but identification

was impossible, due to distance and poor visibility. A good sighting was a Short-eared Owl flying north off the sea. As proof of the unpredictability of seawatching, a record 54 Pomarine Skuas were seen off Worthing that afternoon.

5th May- 7 early risers were treated to the wonderful song of the Nightingale before dawn at Chris Fox's cottage. At first light a walk along North Lane produced songs from Whitethroat, Robin, Wren, and 3 Tit species. Problems were had sorting out the songs of Blackcap and Garden Warbler. Three pairs of the latter were seen. Several Cuckoos and a further Nightingale were seen and heard. Excellent views were had of an aggressive male Roe Deer, which barked at the party for many seconds.

19th May- Bernie Forbes extra trip to the New Forest was a great success, apart from the small number attending. On a walk from Telegraph Hill out to Hampton Ridge, we observed a good number of raptors with sightings of several Buzzards and Sparrowhawks and good views of Hobby were obtained. Of great interest was a Wood Warbler observed building its nest on the forest floor. As expected on a trip to the New Forest, Dartford Warblers were seen and an unexpected bonus was a Nightjar which was flushed by the party.

22nd June - As usual a good turn out met at Greatham Bridge for Brian Metcalfe's evening trip. Scanning the pool produced several Green Sandpipers and Snipe and a Barn Owl was seen hunting along the banks of the Arun. Several Little Owls were seen on the journey to Lavington Common. Disappointingly, the Nightjars did not perform very well although several were heard and one glimpsed. Woodcock performed well in their roding flights.

22nd July - On a perfect day, a large number of members and friends met at Mill Hill to be shown the local butterflies by Graham Hart. On the western slopes of the hill, Chalk Hill Blues abounded and the rare Adonis Blue was also observed at close quarters. Other species

recorded included Essex Skipper, Brimstone, Comma and Gatekeeper, proving the value of the conservation work.

26th August - A wealth of birds were awaiting the inspection of 11 members lead by Clive Hope at the Cissbury ringing site. 15 species were watched being weighed, measured, and ringed. These included such interesting species as both male and female Blackcap, Lesser and Common Whitethroat, Garden Warbler and Spotted Flycatcher. Later, on a walk along the northern side of Cissbury Ring, views were had of juvenile Cuckoo, male and female Sparrowhawk and Redstart.


16th September - The Hollingbury Camp and Wild Park trip, led by Peter Whitcomb, was well attended and it was a pity that not many birds were willing to show themselves. The previous day 10,000 Hirundines were reported in the area. A Sparrowhawk was seen briefly and good views were had of Ring-necked Parakeets feeding on Beech nuts. A flock of these Parakeets have been in the area for some years but they have been greatly reduced in numbers since the 1987 hurricane. Mixed tit flocks, Goldcrest and Chiffchaff were also seen.

21st October - After the disastrous 89 trip, Climping finally showed its true potential in 1990. Ten members joined Richard Ives and were well rewarded for doing so. The weather was rather grey and overcast but this did not deter a huge movement of passerines and geese. Over a 1,000 Goldfinch coasted during the day and there was always something on the move. The sea provided much interest especially as over 300 Brent Geese were recorded returning to their wintering grounds. A flock of 9 Whitefronts were picked out amongst the Brents- a real surprise for everyone. The leader identified a thrush at half a mile distance and received many quizzical looks from the members but once the bird was seen at closer range everyone agreed with the initial identification: a male Ring Ouzel which performed superbly for everyone, A Kingfisher flashed through the trees to end a very enjoyable morning.

24th November - The weather forecast for Dave Smith's Pagham Harbour trip was for wind and rain and for once they were right! However, 10 members did brave the elements and from the North Wall, large numbers of wildfowl were seen these included Brent Geese, Pintail, Wigeon and there were some Black-tailed Godwits amongst the waders recorded. After a soggy lunch back in the cars in Church Lane, a walk to the western end of Pagham Lagoon resulted in views of Water Rail and Kingfisher. A pair of Red-breasted Mergansers and several Little grebes were also present.

29th December - Heavy rain once again spoilt a club trip, this time the post Christmas Adur walk led by Stanley Allen. A few intrepid members turned out but after a brief scan of the Adur Saltings the usual wader and gull count was abandoned. Grey Plover and Oystercatcher were amongst the waders seen. The best bird was found at Widewater where a immature Scaup was located with the Pochard.

INDOOR MEETINGS

Graham Hart of the British Butterfly Conservation Society opened the year with an enthusiastic and lucid talk, well illustrated with his own excellent slides. Graham lives in Shoreham and has spent a great deal of time and energy improving the chances of wild life on Mill Hill. As a result the numbers of butterflies in particular have increased with the careful clearing done by on the Mill Hill slopes. This talk was followed up by an outing led by Graham in July (see Field Outings Report above).

In February Brian Metcalfe entertained us with a talk about the holiday he took in Israel with Hilda, illustrated by his slides. Brian, occasionally prompted with a place-name or bird identification by Hilda enthused about their visit. He pointed out the problems of photography when travelling with a group of enthusiasts all keen to get the bird! The trip took them from northern Israel, Mount Hermon, the Sea of Galilee, the Dead Sea and right down to the northern tip of the Red Sea.

The March talk was given by Ms Steyning from the Wildfowl and Wetland Trust. A very interesting talk and although she had only just taken up the post she spoke with great confidence and showed her obvious flair for the subject. The trials and tribulations of trying to get the New Zealand Blue Duck to breed at Arundel was explained in detail. The successful result meant that another waterfall had to be constructed to make the "newcomers" feel at home. Any more successes will lead to returning the birds back to their natural habitat in the antipodes.

The AGM in April was followed by a light-hearted talk by Chris Fox and Brian Clay about the trials of hunting birds in Costa Rica with little help from identification books - the best one was published after they returned home! They were amusing but informative and the slides complemented their talk showing the difficulty of finding birds in sometimes impenetrable foliage. It was a talk much enjoyed by members.

Perhaps one of the most interesting talks was given by Dr. David Harper in October on "Bird Colour-what it means". He obviously had a deep interest in his subject and he spoke fluently backing up what he said with fascinating examples of bird behaviour. He showed the importance of colour, describing experiments of reducing or changing colour patterns thereby causing a bird to react against those changes. There is still a lot of work to do but he made us think and consider again the importance of colour and patterns of recognition and acceptance amongst birds.

The November meeting brought a welcome return of Mr and Mrs Simpson telling us of the many facets of the conservation work they do all over Sussex. Their slides showed how much time is given by volunteers and those who lead them to keep Sussex working for wildlife and encouraging more people to enjoy the results.

The December Members' Evening was a lively combination of short talks. Brian Metcalfe talked about field marks, the way we look at a bird to check its identification: from supercilium to tail markings. John Ford had some superb slides of crickets and grasshoppers and a great deal of knowledge which he passed on to us. Brianne Reeve talked about some of the natural history work she does with very young children between the ages of 3 and 5 and quoted some of their sayings. She likes to think that if children can been encouraged to enjoy nature at such a young age by introducing them to flowers, birds etc. they can carry those experiences and develop them as they grow up. Stanley Allen had gathered together some slides of his birding trips during the year both abroad and locally. John Stafford had compiled a quiz using his own excellent slides and testing our knowledge with birds which were not always showing us the features Brian had discussed earlier. Perhaps it was appropriate that our Editor Richard Ives identified them all. (not quite true-the diving White headed Duck could have been anything from a Cormorant to a piece of polystyrene! - Ed.) The evening was celebrated in a cheerful manner with wine and various tasty refreshments.

MEMBER'S RECORDS

It would be a great help to the recorder if members could send in their records twice a year, with the second batch in December leaving the last few records to the first 2 weeks of January. Particularly where large numbers are involved this is vital if members are to receive their report shortly after the AGM. A reminder that the Society's record sheets are set out inthe following format:-

SPECIES DATE LOCALITY/NOTES NUMBER OBSERVER

It would be greatly appreciated if records could be submitted in standard "Voous Order" (ie. the order of this report, your checklist or field guide), not for example, in order of sightings on a field trip . As the records log is held in this order it really does save a lot of time and effort. Rarities should have full supporting notes and it would again assist greatly, when sending in a rare or unusual bird record if the observer could state whether the description has been forwarded to the County recorder (either for consideration by the Sussex Ornithological Society Records Committee or the British Birds Rarities Committee if it is sufficiently rare to require their adjudication). There is no need to go into minute detail for those birds considered "unusual" but those records should contain enough salient points to confirm an accurate identification. A list of "unusual" species is published annually in the S.O.S. Bird Report and also in a paper published by that society in 1978 entitled "Identification, Notetaking and Reporting". This is an essential guide to every birdwatcher, whether beginner or experienced observer. I believe that this is still available from the S.O.S.

I am delighted with the volume of records sent in by so many contributors in 1990; also many thanks fro the excellent reponse to my "all records" requests, essential when records begin to show that a species could be in decline. Again, keep them coming in for 1991!
